

On August 26, 2016 the "Last Steps Memorial Arch" was unveiled on a pier behind the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic on the Halifax waterfront.

The Arch was erected in honour of the approximately 350,000 Canadian servicemen and women who deployed from Halifax during the First World War. Around 60,000 never returned.

The Halifax waterfront is where they took their last steps in Canada and now actual combat boot footprints are burned into the wood of the pier leading to the Arch for all to remember their sacrifice.

#### **ALBRECHT, John Frederick**

**WWI** 

John was born in Mahone Bay on 23 December, 1897, and was a school teacher there before enlisting. He was the son of Mrs. Elizabeth Albrecht of Mahone Bay. John enlisted in the full time militia of Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery (RCGA) on 26 March 1916 in Halifax and spent 2 years at the Sandwich Point Battery outside Halifax prior to transferring to the CEF on 22 June 1918. He was discharged in Halifax on 21 December 1918 with the rank of corporal.

#### ALCORN, Murray "Glendon"

**WWII** 

Glendon served the Royal Canadian Army with the West Nova Scotia Regiment in Europe and Italy. He was killed in action on August 9, 1943 in Sicily, Italy, and is buried at Agira Canadian War Cemetery in Sicily.

#### **ALLEN, Hazen Copp**

WWII

Copp was born on December 5, 1905 in Port Elgin, N.B. He joined the Royal Canadian Air Force on November 27, 1941 in Moncton and served in Canada and Labrador until his discharge on February 28, 1946. Copp passed away on June 5, 1985.

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## ALLEN, McKeen "Mack" WWII & SPECIAL DUTY AREA

Mack was born in Northport, Nova Scotia in 1912. H enlisted in the Air Force and served in Canada and in England during World War II and in Special Duty Area. He was killed on January 31, 1943 in a crash while returning to England from Germany. He is buried in Dishforth Cemetery in Northern England. He was awarded the Italy Star, France and Germany Star, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal with Clasp and the 1939-1945 War Medal.

#### ANNAND, Donald Melvin "Don"

#### **WWII**

Don was born on July 17, 1924 in Truro, N.S. He served with the R.C.A.F. during WWII and traveled the world in the Merchant Marine before and after his Air Force service. Don worked for Tidewater Construction of New Glasgow from 1947-1952; moved to Stewiacke, N.S. where he operated the Superline Oil garage and service station, which he later bought and operated under the Petrofina & Esso badges until his retirement in 1992. The late George Aucoin was the son of the late Sevrin and Marie Aucoin of Point Cross, NS. He enlisted in the Canadian Army in 1942 and served until 1946. He served with the Algonquin Regiment in the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Holland. George was a active member of Cheticamp Branch #032, The Royal Canadian Legion, and was Past President. He lived in Cheticamp with his wife before moving to Halifax in the Northwood Manor, where he passed away on April 21, 2006.

#### **AULENBACK, Harold**

WWI

Harold was born in Mahone Bay on 16 May, 1896, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ephraim Aulenback of Maitland Forks. He enlisted in the 25<sup>th</sup> Bn in Halifax in November, 1914, arriving in France in September, 1915. In February, 1916, he was posted to the Canadian Labour Corps, in England and in March he was attached to the Canadian Overseas Railway Construction Corps in France. In August he rejoined the 25<sup>th</sup> Bn and suffered shrapnel wounds to his back during the battle of Courcelette. He was evacuated to England returned to France with the 242<sup>nd</sup> Bn of the Canadian Forestry Corps in February, 1918.

#### **AWALT, Fredy George**

**WWI** 

Fredy was born in Mahone Bay on 3 May, 1896, and enlisted in the CEF in Halifax on 12 June, 1915 - he was in England two months later. He declared that he had served 9 months with the 75<sup>th</sup> Regiment. He served in France with the 13<sup>th</sup> Bn and suffered gunshot wounds to his left forearm on 10 September 1915. He was hospitalized on 16 June, 1916, with shell shock and again on 24 September with shrapnel wounds to his left hand. He was discharged in Halifax on 22 March, 1919, with the rank of lance-corporal.

#### BAKER, James E. "Jim"

**WWII** 

Jim was born in Westville, NS in 1924. He was the son of Edgar and Sarah Baker. During World War Two, he served as Private with the F Battery Artillery as Gunner in the Canadian Army. He served in the United Kingdom and Continental Europe. His decorations include the 1939-1945 Star, France & Germany Star, and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal and Clasp. Jim was a member of the Overseas War Veterans Branch #035. Jim was married to Henrietta Dykens. He passed away on January 10, 1988.

#### **BAKER, Owen Charles**

WWII

Owen was born in East Jeddore, N.S. in 1921. He served in the Navy aboard H.M.C.S. Margaree in the Royal Canadian Navy Reserve as Able Seaman. Owen died at sea in 1940. He is remembered at Halifax Memorial, N.S.

#### **BARKHOUSE**, Daniel

wwi

Daniel enlisted in the 219<sup>th</sup> Bn on 20 March, 1916, in Mahone Bay. Upon enlisting he stated that he had been born in Martins River on 13 July 1896. He arrived in England on 18 October 1916 and was posted to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Canadian Labour Bn on 10 January 1917. He went to France on 25 February, 1917, and was posted to the 11<sup>th</sup> Bn of the Canadian Railway Troops (CRT). He survived the Spanish Flu in March 1919 and was discharged in Halifax on 15 May of that year.

#### **BARKHOUSE**, Harold

**WWI** 

Harold enlisted in 246<sup>th</sup> Battalion (Bn) on 14 December, 1916, in Halifax. He declared that he had been born in Newburn in 1894; had 13 months service in the 'home guard' (Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery (RCGA)); was a lumberman; and that this next of kin was his father Samuel Barkhouse of Newburn. His wife was Rose Barkhouse of Newburn. Harold served in France and Belgium with the 85<sup>th</sup> Bn (NS Highlanders). He was invalided home to Canada on 3 November 1919 discharged on 13 November 1919 as medically unfit due to albuminuria.






#### **BARKHOUSE**, Ira Alvin

Ira enlisted in the CGA on 6 December, 1918, in Halifax. He declared that he was born in Newburn on 16 December 1895; he was a farmer living in Halifax; and that his next of kin was his wife Hazel Barkhouse of Halifax. He served in Canada in the 1st Regiment of the CGA.

#### **BARKHOUSE**, Noble Haudy

Noble enlisted in the Canadian Garrison Artillery (CGA) on 6 December, 1918, in Halifax. He declared that he was born in Newburn on April 8, 1898, and that his next of kin was his father Samuel Barkhouse of Newburn. He served in Canada in the 1<sup>st</sup> Regiment of the CGA.

#### **BARKHOUSE**, Ozem

**WWI** 

Ozem was born in Martins Point on 15 December, 1895, and enlisted in the RCGA in Halifax on 11 November 1915. He declared that he was a carpenter, had 2 years' experience with the 75th Regiment and that his next of kin was Jeannie Barkhouse of Martins Point. He was posted to the St Lucia Battery (Bty) in the Caribbean . Gunner Ozem Barkhouse was discharged in Saint John, NB, on 2 May 1919.

#### **BARRY**, Banford LeRoy

WWI

Banford enlisted in the 112<sup>th</sup> Bn of the CEF in Bridgewater on 3 March 1916. He declared that he was born on 31 May, 1892, in Maitland Forks; was a farmer; and that his father Mr. Anthony Barry, of Maitland Forks, was his next of kin. Before going overseas he set up a pay allotment to a Mrs. Trephina Barry of Maitland Forks. Banford served in France with the 25<sup>th</sup> Bn and suffered a gunshot wound to his right thigh on 17 August 1918. He was discharged in Halifax on 27 February 1919.


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





















#### A Featured Veteran Story

### **EVERETT BAUDOUX**



Everett was born on January 14, 1919 in Stellarton N.S. He was in his late teens when he left his native Stellarton in 1939, before the war had even begun, to join the Royal Air Force in Britain.

"I started flying when I was 17, and I knew from my earliest days that aviation was going to be where my life was," he said in May 2005. "At that time, in the Depression years, the opportunity to get involved in any sort of aviation that could provide you with any sort of a living was very scarce. I applied anywhere in Canada I thought would have me."



More than 2,500 Canadians were enlisted with the RAF and not even half that number was in the ranks in Canada. Eventually, over half of the Canadians in the RAF were killed over the next five years as war broke out in Europe. More than one-third of those pilots also received decorations for their extraordinary bravery an extremely high percentage compared to the other branches of the military. During the course of the war Baudoux was awarded the Distinguished Service Order (DSO) and the Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) for his bravery.

Over the next few years, Baudoux piloted flights that dropped bombs on enemy shipping ports and airfields.



The Hudsons he flew typically had a crew of four or five men, and were armed with machine guns and bombs, but, quite often, pilots would never come back from their missions into Norway and Holland, their planes no match for the German fighters. Baudoux, however, never bailed out, instead making the choice to bring back airplanes that were badly damaged by enemy fire.


By age 23, Baudoux had become a fairly senior fellow and took command of his squadron. Over the next three months, nine of his crews - about 40

men - were lost as they fought to keep supply lines open to Malta as the Allies prepared for Operation TORCH. In 1941, he became one of the first Canadians to pilot an aircraft across the Atlantic to the UK as a member of the British War Purchasing Commission.

After two and a half tours, Baudoux was put on a rest tour so he applied to the Empire Test Pilot School, where the British government began training test pilots in March 1944, to fly state of the art machines. He was the first Canadian to graduate in 1944. He was still doing testing when it was announced that VE-Day had finally arrived. Baudoux participated in the scrapped Avro Arrow project and, in 1946, flew the Gloster Meteor MK3 at RCAF Station St. Hubert, Quebec, to become the first Canadian to pilot a jet aircraft in Canada.

Baudoux had a lifetime career in aviation and flew some 140 different types of aircraft and accumulated over 8,000 flying hours. For his service to the armed forces, Captain Baudoux was awarded the 1939-45 Star, France and Germany Star with clasp, Africa Star, Defence medal, Canadian Volunteer Service medal and clasp and CD with clasp, DSO and DFC.

**WWII** 

Milton was born in 1925. He served the Canadian Army in Canada and the United Kingdom. He passed away in 2005.

#### BECK, Willis

Willis was born in Blockhouse and enlisted in the Royal Canadian Regiment on 1 November, 1915, in Halifax. While in France, on 15 December, 1916, it was discovered that Willis had lied about his age upon enlisting and that his true date of birth was 5 November 1898. He suffered shrapnel wounds to his right arm during the fighting around the Souchez River on 9 June 1917. He suffered a major concussion during the Battle of Passchendaele. In September, 1918, he was returned to England suffering from shell shock. He was discharge on 6 February, 1919, in Halifax.

#### BENJAMIN, William E. "Bill"

WWII

Bill was born in Aylesford, NS and lived his adult life in White Rock, NS. He served with the Royal Canadian Regiment from 1943 to 1944. Bill passed away in 1990.

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#### BLANCHARD, Monson G.

**Boer War** 

Monson was born on June 24, 1864 in Windsor, NS. He served with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment in South Africa. He died from wounds he received on June 15, 1900 in Roodevaal, South Africa.

#### **BLIGH, Orlay**

#### **WWII**

Orlay was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Bligh of Berwick, N.S. After two years at Acadia University, he graduated with an engineering degree, and went on to study aeronautics in Halifax. Passionately involved with sports while growing up in Berwick, he played hockey with the Halifax Wolverines prior to enlisting. Stationed in England in April of 1939, he received his commission as Pilot Officer with the R.C.A.F. Known as the "Smiling Canadian" in British circles, at the age of 24, Orlay was killed in action while flying a bomber plane on February 10, 1940.

WWII

Frank was born in St. Peter's, N.S. in 1923. He served with the R.C.A. #46 District Depot in the United Kingdom, Europe and the North Atlantic. He received the 1939-45 Star, France-Germany Star, and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal. Frank passed away in 2004.

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#### BRANNEN, Joseph W.

**WWII** 

Joe was born on Cape Sable Island, NS in 1917. 'Cape Island' was home except for the war years, 1939-1945. He was a veteran of the World War Two, discharged as a Corporal at the end of hostilities. He was with the West Nova Scotia Regiment and served in the United Kingdom, Central Mediterranean (Italy) and Continental Europe (Holland). He was a charter president of Branch 148, R.C.L., as well as a Life Member and recipient of the Meritorious Service Award. Joe was an active Legion member until shortly before his death in 2002.

Malcolm was born in 1919 in Yarmouth, N.S. He joined the Army and served with the West Nova Scotia Regiment R.C.I.C. in Italy. Malcolm was killed in action in Ortona.

#### **BROWN**, Clifford Clair

#### WWII & KOREA

Clifford was born in Fairfield, Ontario in 1925, the son of Robert and Myrtle (Throop) Brown of the Brockville, Ontario area. He attempted to join the Armed Forces from the time he was 14; he finally made it when he turned 18 in 1943. He served all over Canada from the East to West Coast and in the far North. He made the R.C.A.F. his career, retiring in 1972 to his farm in Lake Pleasant Annapolis County, NS. He served in Japan (Korean airlift), Germany, and the United Kingdom with NATO Forces. Clifford passed away on August 16, 1984.

#### **BRUHM**, Albert Wentworth

#### **WWI**

Albert was born in Mahone Bay on 24 May, 1873, and was a 44 year-old tailor when he enlisted in the 112<sup>th</sup> Bn of CEF in January 1916. Albert arrived in England in July 1916 and, probably due to his age, was posted to the 26<sup>th</sup> Reserve Bn. In February, 1917, he was diagnosed with myalgia and returned to Canada. Albert Bruhm was discharged in Halifax on 18 November 1917. He died in Mahone Bay in 1949.

#### **BRUHM**, Angus

**WWI** 

Angus enlisted in the 112th Bn on 2 March, 1916, in Bridgewater. Upon enlisting he declared that he had been born in West Northfield on 21 March, 1889, and that his next of kin was his brother Lock Bruhm. Private Angus Bruhm was discharged on 3 May, 1916, as medically unfit due to "bad feet."

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#### **BRUHM**, Henry Douglas

**WWII** 

Henry was born in Bridgewater, NS in 1921. He served the Royal Canadian Army in the United Kingdom. Henry had been a member of Bridgewater Branch #24, The Royal Canadian Legion for thirty-three years before he passed away in 1992.

#### BRUHM, Ira Wendall

Ira, "officially" enlisted in CEF on 12 December, 1918, in Halifax. He declared that he had been born in Blockhouse on 18 November, 1900, (in fact he was born on 18 November 1901.) Fifteen year-old Ira Bruhm lied about his age and enlisted in the full time militia in May 1917. He served in Halifax with the Composite Bn and the Royal Canadian Engineers. Sapper Bruhm was discharged as medically unfit, due to a nasal obstruction, on 22 May 1919 in Halifax.

#### **BRUNT**, Charles Locklin

**WWII** 

Charles was born on December 9, 1904 in Truro, N.S. He enlisted with the Army and served as a Gunner in the Halifax Rifles in Canada until his medical discharge in 1943. He received the C.V.S.M. Ribbon and 1939-45 War Medal. Charles passed away on February 12, 1962, and is buried in Fairview Cemetery alongside other Veterans.

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#### **BRYDON, Francis Samuel**

WWII

Francis was born in Somerset, N.S. He was 19 years old when he enlisted with the R.C.A.F. After training in Nova Scotia, Manitoba and Quebec, he graduated as Sergeant Navigator in June 1943 and was commissioned overseas the following month. On June 1, 1944, the bomber plane Francis was navigating set out on a mission over France. Completing the mission successfully, the plane was returning to home base when they were picked up by searchlights and became the target of enemy fire. The plane caught fire and three of the crew managed to bail out, but Francis and three of his companions were unable to escape before the plane crashed killing all four members.

#### **BUCHANAN**, Kenneth Purdy

**WWII** 

Kenneth served with the North Nova Scotia Highlanders, R.C.I.C. He was killed on May 6, 1945 at the age of 24. Kenneth is buried at the Holten Canadian War Cemetery, Netherlands (Grave Reference VII. F. 13.)

#### **BUCHANAN**, Robert William

WWII

William was born in Grand Anse, N.S. in 1919. He served the Royal Canadian Army with the Cape Breton Highlanders in Canada, Britain, Central Mediterranean and Northwest Europe. Robert passed away in 1999.

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#### **BURGOYNE**, Arthur Bennett

Arthur enlisted in the 1st Depot Bn of the NS Regiment in Halifax on 16 April 1918. Upon enlisting he noted that he had two years of service in the Halifax Composite Bn. Arthur arrived in England on 27 July, 1918, and was quickly posted to the 87th Bn in France. He was wounded and declared medically unfit for service on 30 November 1918. Arthur returned to Canada and was discharged in Halifax on 5 June 1919. His son Laurel would serve as a pilot in the RCAF during WW II. Arthur died in 1966.


#### BURGOYNE, Dawson J. F.

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






#### CAMERON, Ewen M.

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
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#### **CAMERON**, Roderick Joseph

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

Jerry was born on April 30, 1886, the son of Hugh and Sarah (MacNeil) Campbell of Jamesville West. He joined the Army and went to England with the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Division on October 15, 1914, into France on February 15, 1915 and into the trenches in mid-April. On April 22, 1915, Germans released 160 tons of chlorine gas (5700 cylinders); using cloth soaked in urine as mask, the Canadians closed the gap as the French (Algerian) army fled and stopped the German attack. Cpl. Campbell survived many battles until he was killed on June 3, 1916 at the age of thirty in the Battle of Mount Sorrel. He has no known grave; his name is engraved in Stone Panels ay Ypres Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres, Belgium. "To those lost without a trace in the Ypres Salient".






#### **COCHRAN, Wilfred Northrup**

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
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


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#### COGGIN (COGGON), George Arthur




#### **CORKUM, Harold Victor**

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
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
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












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#### DUDKA, Bill WWII


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## A Featured Veteran Story

# JOHN BARSS "HAL" HARRINGTON



Barss was born on Feb. 10, 1888 in Canso, Nova Scotia. On Jan. 11, 1916, at Wainwright, Alberta, he enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces (Infantry) and served with 151<sup>st</sup> (Central Alberta) Battalion and 16th Battalion (Canadian Scottish) in England and France.

Private Harrington was assigned to the 16<sup>th</sup> Battalion and crossed the English Channel to the Canadian Corps Reinforcement Camp in France on Nov. 13, 1916.

The 16<sup>th</sup> Battalion (Canadian Scottish) was among the first units organized for overseas service, created at Valcartier, QC, on Sept. 2, 1914. Drawing its initial recruits from four Canadian Highland

regiments, the 16<sup>th</sup> was part of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Brigade, 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Division, and had crossed the Atlantic to England with the First Canadian Contingent in October 1914, arriving at the front early the following year.

The 16<sup>th</sup>'s first tour at the front since Barss's arrival began on Dec. 13, when the unit entered the line at Berthonval Wood in brigade support. Conditions at that time of year were far from comfortable, as the battalion's war diary recorded: "Weather wet and ground very muddy. ... Front line in bad condition." As a new arrival, Barss did not immediately see duty in the front trenches. He described his situation in a Dec. 14 letter to Irene, a friend from Alberta whose surname is unknown:

"The weather is fine here now but very changeable. You can hear the guns plainly. ... Things seem quiet, most too quiet to last long to my way of thinking. Some day there will be an awful bust up, and then either the finish or some of the worst since the war started. But we hope it will be finished ere long. I can stand anything that the average man can. Therefore, why should I worry. You bet your life we will see it through come what may and here's hoping we come back safely."

The battalion served in rotation until Dec. 23, when the 16th retired to Maisnil-lès-Ruitz for another period of rest and training. This pattern was typical of winter front line service, with little combat due to the weather. Barss described his



accommodations at the front in a letter to Layton and Mary on Dec. 24, 1916:

"I will give you a description of our dugout. As the name implies, it is in the ground and resembles one of our potato pits. The one we had held three men. When we went in, there was just a chimney in it so we made a fire, but it smoked us out the first night. Then next day, I got some tin and clay and built a fireplace. After that every night we had a grand old fire to dry our clothes by. Then we shifted to another place and we had a dugout which held 10 men. It was like a hotel in that it had spring bunks to sleep on. The only drawback was that you had to keep candles burning all the time."

The battalion moved to Estrée-Cauchie on April 3 in preparation for the Canadian Corps attack on Vimy Ridge. Two days later, three of its four companies moved to the forward area, while the fourth remained nearby in reserve. On April 6, officers received news of a 24-hour postponement due to poor weather. Meanwhile, raiding parties reconnoitered the enemy's wire, conducting daylight excursions into no Man's land. The battalion's remaining company moved forward on April 8.

At 3:58 a.m. on the morning of April 9, 1917, the entire 16th Battalion gathered at its assigned assembly position; the operation started with a massive artillery barrage at 5:30 a.m. With the 14th Battalion (Royal Montreal Regiment) to its right and the 18th Battalion (a Western Ontario unit) to its left, Barss and the men of the 16th Canadian Scottish went over the top at 5:32 a.m.

The war diary noted that "one piper went with each company" as the men advanced across no man's land. All objectives were reached within hours as the battalion captured 100 German prisoners. Barss provided a detailed description of his Vimy experience in an April 23, 1917, letter to Irene:

"On the 7th we moved from the billets to the front line with orders to go over in the morning. It poured rain all the way

into the front line. We went overland to the front line as the trenches were waist deep in mud and water. We were in battle order which means haversack on back and hand bags and a shovel to each man besides bombs and aeroplane signals, artillery flags, etc. When we reached our dugouts in the line we were placed on sentry. Had to stand all night. We did not get much sleep in the daytime as the dugout was wet and we dare not light a fire.

"About six o'clock order came that we would be relieved at ten o'clock that night. We were kind of glad in a way but yet we would have liked to have got over and had done with it. However, we were relieved and had two days of rest behind the line. Well, on Sunday night we got orders to move into the line again. So we knew what was coming. We pulled out overland from our position on which we were to go over the top. There was no trench proper as it was an old dis-used French trench in which we were to form up. ... We arrived in position without any casualties but shelled all the time.

"In the early hours of the morning we got our orders to be ready. In the twinkling of an eye every gun on the twelve mile front turned loose. It was a sight never to be forgotten — at least it will never be forgotten by me. In a very short space of time we were in the (German) front line, or at least what was left of it. It was levelled. The only way you could tell it was by an occasional iron stake with some barbed wire hanging to it.

"We kept on right behind our barrage to the next (German) line or his supposed line; the same thing was apparent here — everything turned upside down from shell fire. We went for about a half a mile or more without making a stop. We halted for a short time then away we went again. Had not gone far when we struck a road. There seems to have been heavy German casualties here as they were lying everywhere on the road or what was left of it.

"Huge trees had been cut right down by a shell hitting them. We advanced a short way across the road to a trench where we got in. ... It did not take long to finish them off. ... We took four machine guns at one place. It was a huge success. I suppose you will have read about it now in the daily papers. I would like to take you over the ground we went over just two weeks ago. If you had gone over before and after the advance you would hardly believe your own eyes."

By midsummer, Barss and his comrades were accommodated in billets. He provided Irene with an update

in a letter dated July 30, 1917, but the letter also carries an ominous note:

"We have a job in front of us; by all accounts it is to be no snap. But I suppose that is what we are here for. I am leaving all my personal effects with one of the boys who is not going in — in case anything happens. For in a case of this kind one never knows what may happen. We have been through before but I guess we can do the same again."

The unit remained at Mazingarbe until Aug. 13, when personnel relocated to trenches near Loos in preparation for the assault on a position known as Hill 70. The war diary reported trench strength as 656, "all ranks," prior to the attack. It also noted the challenges posed by the battalion's location as the time for battle neared:

"It meant assembling a great number of men in the front line and, had the enemy opened a heavy barrage before zero hour, our attack might have been paralyzed before it was launched."

But no such barrage occurred, allowing Barss and his comrades to move into attack positions at 2:30 a.m. Aug. 15. At zero hour, 4:25 a.m., the entire battalion "leaped out of the trenches led by its Pipers" and followed the supporting barrage. The 16th met with "little or no resistance" in the German front and support lines, and the men quickly reached their objective and set about consolidating the new line.

The next day, Aug. 16, 1917, Barss and the men in the front trenches were not so fortunate. Enemy artillery found the range of their new front line and close support trenches. The position was "shelled heavily all that day and evening and we had considerable casualties."

The successful capture of Hill 70 came at considerable cost. While a few men were lost in the initial day's action, the heavy shelling the next day took a much greater toll. Two officers and 35 members of other ranks (OR) were killed, with nine OR missing, and five officers and 201 OR wounded.

Among the missing in the aftermath of the Aug. 16 artillery barrage was Pte. John Barss Harrington of Canso, N.S. His remains were never located; his name is inscribed on the massive memorial erected at Vimy Ridge after the war, one of over 11,000 Canadian soldiers recorded as "missing, presumed dead" in France.

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#### HARRIS, Edward Harlow

He reverted to Cpl on August 29, 1943. He was posted to West Nova Scotia Regiment on October 16, 1943. George was admitted to 9 Field Ambulance (sick) on October 20, 1940 and was transferred to 54 Gen Hospital, then to 5th Gen Hospital, and finally to 15th Gen Hospital. He was posted to West Nova Scotia Regiment on December 23, 1943. George was wounded in action at 1430 hours on January 5, 1944 by machine gun fire. George died of his wounds on January 13, 1944 at 0915 hours at the age of 27, in Italy. 

Colin passed away on the night of the 11/12 of June 1943, when the Wellington Air Craft HE 392, with a crew of 5, was shot down on a raid on the Rhur, Germany by enemy fighters; it crashed, hitting the ground at high speed near Schagen, Holland. One body was recovered then and four others were recovered in 1993 and buried in Bergen-op-Zoom War Cemetery.

James, son of Dan F. and Mary Ann (MacKenzie) MacInnis of Grand Narrows, joined the Cape Breton Highlanders from NPAM on September 2, 1939 and was stationed in North Sydney. He was promoted to L/Cpl on July 11, 1940 and Cpl on June 1, 1941. James was stationed in Sydney, Mulgrave, Sussex, Ranges Ott, Camp Borden, and Debert. He embarked for overseas on November 10, 1941 arriving in Liverpool, England. He married Margery E. Lovell at Church of St. Mary Mother of Christ on December 2, 1943. He was promoted to L Sgt on March 23, 1944 and reverted back to Cpl on May 24, 1944. James embarked to Italy on October 27, 1943; fifteen months later, on February 24, 1945, he left Italy via South France to join the 1st Canadian Army in Holland. He was killed in action in the taking of Delfzijl. After 5 years and 8 months of training and 1 year and 8 months of fighting, James "Ginny" was killed on May 1, 1945, three days before the unconditional surrender of the Germans in Holland and North Germany.

#### MacKENZIE, Joseph H.

Joseph was born in Rear Big Beach, NS in 1894. He was the son of Archibald J. and Catherine (Campbell) MacKenzie. He enlisted in the 94th Bn of Baddeck in 1914 then transferred to the 40th Bn to go overseas. He served in England and in France during World War I. Joseph used his brother's records – Hugh F., who was in the 94th. He transferred to the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles and was promoted to Sgt. at Vimy Ridge. He was killed as Passchendaele on October 31, 1917, at the age of 23. The third battle of Ypres, known as the battle of Passchendaele in Flanders, was the worst battle; bodies and debris of early battles were not buried because of the mud, water, and shelling. Some drowned in shell holes of liquid mud on the bayonet charge to clear machine gun nests at Vapour Farm, Major George Pearks, MacKenzie's commanding officer was awarded the Victoria Cross.



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
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# MacKINNON, Malcolm Joseph

Malcolm was born on March 23, 1894, the son of John A. and Peggy (MacNeil) MacKinnon of Iona Rear. He enlisted in the Army and served with the RCR in England and in France during World War I. In the battle of Courcelette, the Regiment was to capture German trenches in front of the City. They were under heavy artillery and machine gun fire all the way across no-man's land. After fighting off counter attacks the regiment had to withdraw as there wasn't enough troops left to hold the position and had run out of ammunition. Pte. MacKinnon was killed on October 8, 1916 at age 24; he has no known grave. His name is inscribed on the ramparts of the Great Vimy Memorial with the names of 11,285 Canadian soldiers posted missing, presumed dead.

Martin, born 1891, was the son of Joseph H. and Margaret (MacLellan) MacKinnon of Beaver Cove. The Canadians advanced seven miles, eliminating two German divisions and took 5,000 prisoners; the next day they advanced two miles against great odds – eight fresh German divisions. In advancing over twelve miles on a five mile front, Canadians took close to 9,000 prisoners at a cost of 12,000 casualties.

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
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### MacKINTOSH, Fraser Gerald WWII & Korea

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

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
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#### MacNEIL, John Allan

He enlisted in the Army and served with the 25<sup>th</sup> Battalion in England and in France during World War I. John A. MacNeil was in the battle to take Vimy Ridge. The French and British counted 130,000 dead and wounded. Pte. MacNeil was killed on April 28, 1917, at the age of 27, and has no known grave. His name is inscribed on the ramparts of the Vimy Memorial: "To the valor of their countrymen in the Great War and in memory of their 60,000 dead this monument is raised by the people of Canada."

John Murdock MacNeil of Washabuck, NS, son of John A. MacNeil, was a Sergeant in the 94<sup>th</sup> Regiment of Baddeck. He was taken on strength on November 26, 1914 as a Pte. He served in England and in France during World War I. John was killed in the Battle of Mount Sorrel, the same battle as Jerry Campbell, while serving with the 25<sup>th</sup> Battalion. A very heavy German artillery shelling lasted for a day and a half; one unit lost over 60 officers and men. This battle cost nearly 8,000 casualties; it lasted from June 2 to June 13, 1916. John Murdock was killed on June 10, 1916 and has no known grave. His name is engraved in Stone Panels at Ypres Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres, Belgium, "to those lost without a trace in the Ypres Salient."

Leo MacNeil of MacNeil's Vale, Rear Iona, was born on June 27, 1895, to Dan S. and Katie (MacDonald) MacNeil. He joined the 185<sup>th</sup> Cape Breton Highlanders. Formed in 1916, it was meant to form a Highland Bde from Nova Scotia but was used to reinforce other units. He served in England and in France during World War I. Leo transferred to the 85<sup>th</sup> Bn Nova Scotia then to the 73<sup>rd</sup> Bn Royal Highland Regiment of Canada (Black Watch). He was killed on February 26, 1917, at the age of 21, in the Battle of Vimy Ridge. When the Germans couldn't take Paris they consolidated at Vimy Ridge, a nine mile barrier; in 1915 the French couldn't take it and the British in 1916 couldn't. In five days the Canadians took Vimy Ridge at a cost of 11,000 casualties and advanced four miles, taking 4,000 prisoners and over 50 guns.

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### A Featured Veteran Story

## JOHN W. "JACK" TATE



John William "Jack" Tate was born on Aug. 29, 1880, at Melrose, Guysborough County, a tiny settlement 17 kilometres from Sherbrooke. The eldest of Daniel and Annie (Sullivan) Tate's 10 children, Jack set out to "see the world" while still in his teens.

Jack spent several years in the United States, serving on a U.S. navy submarine for six months and with the U.S. Army Coast Artillery Corps for two years. He eventually made his way back to Canada, working as a teamster in Alberta.

On Aug. 10, 1914, officials authorized the formation of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, with members to be recruited in the country's six largest cities — Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Calgary and Edmonton. When war erupted in Europe, Jack, now in Edmonton, saw another opportunity for adventure, enlisting with Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry within days of its formation.

To ensure rapid deployment and limit training requirements, recruiters focused on attracting former British Army and Boer War veterans. Enlistments surpassed 3,000 by Aug. 19, the initial recruits converging on Ottawa from across the country within days of volunteering. Jack Tate was among a large group that travelled from Edmonton to the nation's capital, where military officials reduced the number to 1,098 "other ranks" (OR), 1,049 of whom had served with British Imperial forces. While Jack had no such credentials, his American experience no doubt helped his case, and the scars on the back of his head and neck suggested a rugged past. Jack also misreported his birth year as 1885 to enhance his chances. In the end, he passed muster, formally attesting for overseas service at Ottawa on Aug. 24, 1914.

Four days later, Jack and his chums travelled by train to Montreal and boarded SS Megantic for the journey to England. Fears of a German U-boat attack in the North Atlantic forced the vessel to dock at Levis, QC, where its passengers disembarked and resumed training.

The battalion finally boarded SS Royal George at Quebec City on Sept. 27 and departed for England. Upon arriving overseas one week later, personnel made their way to camp on Salisbury Plain, southwest of London, and resumed preparations for combat. By month's end, the unit was assigned to the  $27^{\text{th}}$  British Division's  $80^{\text{th}}$  Brigade.

The unit crossed the English Channel to Le Havre, France, on the night of Dec. 20-21. Jack and his companions disembarked after midday, becoming the first Canadian combat unit to set foot in France and the only one deployed in the combat zone in 1914.

After spending Christmas Day at Blaringhem, France, the battalion made its way to Ypres, Belgium, its officers visiting the trenches near Kemmel before year's end. The battalion marched to nearby



Dickebusch on Jan. 5, 1915, entering the trenches for its first tour the following day.

Jack and his chums were immediately introduced to the realities of wintertime service in the Ypres Salient, occupying 1,150 yards of trench "in waterlogged condition (with) few dugouts." The brigade's commander reported: "All men are over their ankles in water — some up to their knees."

The unit served on rotation in the line through the winter of 1915. Its Jan. 31 war diary entry summarized the first month's casualties: three officers killed and two wounded; 20 OR killed and 30 wounded. Jack was evacuated to Rouen, France, for treatment of myalgia on Jan. 27. Discharged to convalescent camp 10 days later, he rejoined the unit on Feb. 15. Two days after his return, Jack followed his chums into the line near St. Eloi, Belgium, spending two days in the front trenches before retiring to support positions. The battalion returned to the front line on Feb. 27 amid "very cold, boisterous weather and wind."

Later that day, the unit received orders to attack a German sap a mere 14 metres from its line, its first offensive action of the war. The raiding party crossed no man's land at 4:30 a.m. on Feb. 28, entering and destroying the sap and 30 yards of parapet along the German front line. The unit's war diary reported five OR killed, two officers and seven OR wounded, one officer and two OR missing as the raiding party returned to the unit's trenches before daybreak. Several wounded lay in no man's land, unable to make their way back.

When officers requested volunteers to retrieve their wounded comrades, Jack was one of 10 soldiers who climbed over the parapet as night was lifting. A German sniper spotted the rescue party as it crept into no man's land. Jack was struck and killed in the gunfire, his comrades later retrieving his remains.

Pte. Jack Tate was laid to rest in Voormezeele Cemetery, Belgium, on March 13, 1915, the first of almost 3,400 Nova Scotian fatalities on the Western Front during the First World War.

Our friends have gone, no more to know;

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
