The caseload has increased; in Sept 2017 NSNU Command Service Officers had 300 Veteran's Affairs open files, 486 at the end of 2017 and 791 in 2018. As of January 2019 there are 239 open files.

2) NSLC Proposal re Poppy Campaign

NS/NU Poppy and Remembrance Committee Chairman Don McCumber reported that in October of 2018 the Nova Scotia Liquor Commission expressed concern regarding the security of poppy campaign collection boxes placed on the stores' cash out counters. Further, the NSLC have advised that unattended collection boxes and items for sale at tables in their stores can no longer be permitted due to potential liability. NSLC proposes that we adopt their cash can policy whereby they will collect donations for the month of November and will submit funds raised to local Branches. In discussion it was noted that the proposal would not run in accordance with the annual Poppy Campaign. The meeting agreed to respond by thanking NSLC and informing the Commission that NS/NU Command agrees to communicate with Branches that tables placed in the NSLC Stores in order to distribute poppies are to be manned at all times and all materials removed when unattended. It was agreed that when confirmation of the agreement is received from the NSLC an ABMO be sent to Branches prior to the campaign to outline the procedures to be followed.

5) Legion Lager

Executive Director Valerie Mitchell-Veinotte advised the meeting that National Headquarters seeks input from NS/NU Command Executive Council on the potential of introducing Legion Lager to the Nova Scotia market. She explained that Legion Lager is brewed by Whitewater Brewing Company of British Columbia and is currently available in several provinces and territories in the country. Various routes could be open in having the product available in Nova Scotia including Whitewater Brewing Company applying to sell Legion Lager through Nova Scotia Liquor Commission or to have a local brewing company brew and package the product, selling it through their distribution and licensing with NSLC. In discussion It was agreed that NS/NU Command Executive Council does not support the introduction of Legion Lager to the Nova Scotia market.

6) Branch Service Officer Conduct/District A Letter

Comrade Ted Martens expressed concern, given the response of the NS/NU Command By-laws Committee on the matter of lack of recourse should Branch Service Officers not fulfill the responsibility of extending assistance as required from Branch Poppy Trust Funds. District Commander Malin received confirmation that the elections are required to take place prior to the District meeting so that the installation of officers can be completed at that meeting as required.
- 2) District F Commander Richard Malin forwarded information on a proposal for a 50/50 lottery from the Nova Scotia Alcohol and Gaming Commission to NS/NU Command Liquor/Gaming Committee Chairman Mervin Steadman.

17. Presidents' Closing Remarks

NS/NU Command President Melvin Crowe congratulated Comrade Steve Wessel on his retirement from work and extended thanks on behalf of all Members of NS/NU Command for his dedicated service at all levels within The Royal Canadian Legion.

President Crowe thanked Comrade Ted Martens for his service to The Royal Canadian Legion highlighting his 30 plus years on Executive Council and recognizing that Executive Council was losing their only Second World War Veteran.

Our bureau is dealing with Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) disability applications, reviews/appeals and Benevolent fund applications.

In 2018:

- we handled 791 Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) files*
- we made 27 home visits
- we had 219 favorable and 22 unfavorable VAC disability claim decisions
- we were responsible for over \$11.5 million dollars awarded in financial lump sums for VAC disability claims, 20 new monthly pensions and increases. As important to these monetary pay outs are the medical benefits given to each person for the rest of their life.

Since 1 Jan and as of 25 Jan 2019:

- we are handling 239 active files*
- we made 2 home visits
- we had 33 favorable VAC disability claim decisions
- we have been responsible for approx. \$1.3 million dollars awarded in financial lump sums for VAC disability claims. As important to these monetary pay outs are the medical benefits given to each person for the rest of their life.

*This includes Disability claims, but also such things as Veterans Independence Program applications, Caregiver Recognition Benefit applications, Survivor applications, etc.

Since the last report our Bureau Service Officers attended the National Service Officer Professional Development Seminar in Charlottetown PE from 22-26 Oct 2018, met with new members of the OSI clinic on 6 Nov 2018 and participated in 2 National Service Officer teleconferences and have been invited to attend the Eastern Service Officer Professional Development Seminar in Montreal QC from 10-12 Sep 2019.

On behalf of the Command Service Bureau, thanks to all the Branch Service Officers, Branch Executive and members for their dedication and determination. Also, to the Command Executive for their unwavering support. The work of the Service Bureau would not be accomplished without all your assistance.

Appeals, Complaints, Finance, Building, Liquor and Gaming, Personnel, Poppy and Remembrance, Resolutions, NS/NU Command Convention.

Affairs related to aforementioned Committees will be reported appropriately through the Committee Chairmen.

At the direction of the Command President I continue to consult as required with all other Committees, District Commanders, Zone Commanders, and Branches and to carry out special assignments.

The day to day business of NS/NU Command continues to be affected appropriately.

Following are matters of particular note:

From the Command Office point of view, the 2018 Poppy campaign experienced few complications with supply from Dominion Command. As usual, by end June Branches were provided with all information pertaining to the campagain, including order forms, deadline for order submissions and deadline for submission of Branch Status Reports for Poppy Trust Funds. Reminders were mailed and e-mailed regularly and phone calls made directly to Branches leading up to those deadlines. Despite this proactive approach there were Branches that were late in submitting orders and late with the PTF Status reports. In communication directly with these Branches, the prevailing issue seemed to be that

handovers to new Poppy and Remembrance Chairmen was either non existent and/or insufficient. This information has been discussed with the Poppy and Remembrance Committee Chairman.

Identification of Issues related to questioning of information provided in the Branch Monthly Financial reports regarding Branch Poppy Trust Funds led to the decision of the Command President, in consultation with the Command Poppy and Remembrance Committee Chairman and the Command Treasurer, to have, on a go forward basis, questions raised brought to the attention of the Command P&R Chairman then, if required, addressed directly to the Branch Poppy and Remembrance Committee Chairmen by Command staff. This process is intended to allow for a more direct opportunity to provide timely direction, in accordance with the allowable use of poppy trust funds, to Branches as required, to improve the response time and to reduce the workload of the Command Treasurer, District and Zone Commanders. It is intended that Branches found to be frequently in contravention of parameters outlined in the Poppy Manual will be brought to the attention of District and Zones Commanders to arrange for training and mentoring.

The caseload of the Command Service Officers remains high, therefore this office has taken full responsibility for all Benevolent files.

An Information Session covering the scope of the Commands' Benevolent Financial Assistance Fund, Veterans Outreach Committee, Poppy and Remembrance as well as the roles of the Command and Branch Service Officers is scheduled to be held at the Command Office March 04. Each Committee Chairman will make a presentation as will the Command Service Officers. Capacity of 50 attendees has been reached.

In late November a highly productive Executive Directors' Professional Development took place at National Headquarters.

In early December, at the invitation of RCL Branch 168 President, Chris Groves, the Branch AGM was attended. The usual outstanding hospitality of Branch 168 was greatly appreciated. Branch 169 3rd Vice President was also in attendance and provided an update on the affairs of the Branch.

The 2019 NS/NU Command Convention Call was sent to all Branches in early January. Branches should be reminded to submit credentials at the earliest opportunity and that signed credential certificates must be submitted even if the Branch will not send Delegates to Convention.

The 2018 financial audit is underway. The Auditors are scheduled to present the statements to NS/NU Command Sub-Executive March 16 2019.

795 Air Cadet Squadron remains the flagship programme of Branch #168.


Our Cadets have been very busy and have continued to participate in regional and national biathlon and marksmanship competitions, as well as having attended in a fencing Tournament this December.

Executive Council moved and carried a motion to repaint the parking lot line at the quoted of \$978.00 + HST from Safety First-SFC Ltd. Looking for a better price then quoted, GRAMAC Ltd completed the job for \$632.50 taxes included.

NS/NU Command Building Power Efficiency. When I first approached Council about the amount of electricity used by the Command Building averaged over 6000 Kilo Watts consumption per month. With the installation of programable thermostats, Heat Pumps and LED, Office equipment upgrades, the Command, for 2018, now averages 3064 Kilo watts per month. This calculates out to 49% savings in power and cost.

#### I bring forward these three projects for Council consideration.

- 1. Even before the installation of heat pumps there has been an issue with heating and cooling of the three main offices that are used by the two service officers and the Executive Director. With the insulation of the Heat pump in the main office, this has become more evident. It was and still is very hard to keep all the offices at the appropriate temperature.
  - a. Two options:
    - Upgrade the electric baseboard heaters. This would solve the heat issue, but not the cooling. The offices get very hot in the summer when the doors are closed for privacy.
    - ii. Install an additional heat pump with three heads, MacDow Mechanical Ltd has quoted a price for the system installed at \$ 8,450.00 plus HST.
- 2. The main entrance door is not meet the Accessibility Act for Nova Scotia. Many of our Veterans coming to Command have issues with mobility that may not allow them easily to enter the building. I have no idea of the cost involved in this project, it will not be cheap.
- 3. The building corner drain project has been on the books for some time.

Note: These projects are Capital Project that affect the budget slightly, as they and costed over a long period of time @ budget line 5245 Amortization.

#### NS/NU COMMAND BY-LAW AMENDMENT/CHANGES

1. As per M 29, the following proposed amendment to the Command By Law Article 514 A and B was submitted to Dominion Command for approval.

514 b. "Should circumstances arise whereby NS/NU Command President and/or any Member of the Personnel Committee be perceived to be or deemed to be in a position of conflict of interest concerning personnel, the non-affected Members of the Executive Council will provide recommendation for an alternate Member to be appointed from within the Executive Council to be approved by the Executive Council."

The Dominion Command Constitution and Laws Committee reviewed the proposed amendments to the NS/NU Command By-Laws for 2018. The proposed amendments have been approved in accordance with GBL s. 512.a, with the exception of proposed new subsection 514.b.:

- The members found the wording of the proposed new subsection 514.b. as problematic. It was felt that the subsection should either make a general statement about not acting when in conflict or provide some assistance on when a conflict is deemed to exist (although not all conflicts can be included with any definition).
- NS/NU Command should, therefore, define when a conflict is deemed to exist and the consequences when it does (as was done in GBL 301.c) but leave out who determines it (it is impossible to limit who can raise the issue). In that way, it is open for anyone to perceive / allege the conflict, even and preferably the individual themselves. As to who judges its existence after the allegation of a conflict, it is not unreasonable for the other Executive Council members to make the determination through a vote if the individual in question does not voluntarily recuse themselves.

Please re-submit a revised section 514B for DC C&L review.

All other By Law changes where approved and published into our Command By Law Document.

As per the minutes of September Executive Council, the following approved changes where inserted into the NS/NU Command Policy & Guidelines.

1. Terms of Reference – Command Legion Magazine. See Appendix H.

- 2. New Policy Human Rights. See Appendix I.
- 3. Section V Finance, para 6 Distribution of YTD Financial Statements. See Appendix J.
- 4. Removal of Section III Staff of the NS/NU Command Policy and Guidelines Manual.

The Committee meet December 5, 2018 and discussed the following By-Law and Policy amendment/changes.

1. The proposed amendment to By law 1009 Complaints was reviewed for clarification.

Reasoning for the wording changes was to state "Command will levy a fee of \$100.00 on all appeals". We removed the \$100 complaint wording because that fee is already covered in the GBL.

### EXISTING BY-LAW CHANGE/AMENDMENT

**PROPOSED** 

1009 Command reserves the right to levy a nominal fee of \$100.00 on all complaints and appeals to be heard or reviewed by the Command Complaint Committee or the Command Appeal Committee and that this fee would be returned upon the issuing of a favourable decision upholding the complaint or appeal.

**1009** Command will levy a fee of \$100.00 on all appeals lodged with Command. This fee would be returned upon the issuing of a favourable decision of the appellant.

- 2. The committee asked the secretary to send out five letters to Branches/Zone/District Commanders with respect to the Command not receiving a copy of their up to date by-laws.
- 3. The committee agreed to bring two items forward for discussion:
  - change the Executive Director/Secretary title references in NS/NU Command By-Laws and NS/NU Command Policy and Guidelines.
  - change the Honours and Awards Committee name to Ritual, Awards and Protocol
    Committee to be inline with Dominion Command. It was recommended that all references
    in NS/NU Command By-Laws and Policy are to be changed to Ritual, Awards and Protocol
    (RAP) Committee.
- 4. The committee reviewed 38 by law amendments for seven branches.

#### Membership Report February 9, 2019

#### DOMINION COMMAND REPORT

#### For 2019:

- We have processed 174,580 2019 memberships to date down 7,000 to the same time last year.
- We have processed 9,102 new members (including the free Veterans Welcome Program) up 28% to the same time last year

#### PROCESSING WEBSITE UPDATE

- 26,850 members have now created an online profile (providing us with their email addresses and allowing them to renew online). We now have 69,000 member email addresses on file (25% of all members).
- 1233 Branches (88%) have logged on to the membership website.
- 726 Branches (52%) are fully processing members on the portal.
- 1176 Branches (84%) have now provided their branch rate allowing their members to renew online.

The Membership Department is now processing 2019 dues submitted in the month of January. With over 50% of the branches renewing online, memberships are being processed faster than in previous years.

Dominion Command has offered a \$2500 Gift Card from Shoppers Drug Mart to members who renew their membership online. Their branch also receives a \$2500 grocery gift card. Life members and members who have already can also have their name entered into the draw by logging into their profile or creating their profile.

#### EMAIL ADDRESSES

Branches are reminded to use their **legion.ca branch** email when corresponding with Dominion Command. When a member pays online, the branch will be informed through this email address.

#### PROVINCIAL REPORT

To date we have over 60% of our members renewed their 2019 dues. Dominion Command will be sending out an email to all the members who have not renewed their membership for 2019 in early February, and in early March, a post card reminder will be mailed to all those members that have submitted their address, but have not renewed their membership. Please remind your branches to contact these members and encourage them to renew their membership for 2019.

Branches need to look at the number of bad addresses that are on file on their Branch Membership Reports. These can be found on their Branch Portal under reports and under the tab bad addresses. Membership chairman can simply input the correct information to rectify this. The member who doesn't have a correct address risks the chance of not receiving the Legion magazine. Canada Post requires a civic address, so those members with a RR # listed as their address are starting to show up as bad addresses.

#### **BRANCH RATES**

Over the next few weeks, NS/NU Command will be contracting those branches who do not have their 2019 branch rates updated on the portal.

#### FREE MEMBERSHIPS

The Legion offers, one-year free membership for still serving or retired CAF and RCMP members who have not been a member of the Legion and for graduating Cadets. The applications can be found on the Legion.ca website.

#### The Royal Canadian Legion Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command Poppy and Remembrance Committee Report to Executive Council February 09 2019

As this will be my last report to Executive Council before Convention, I would like to thank Comrade President Crowe for the opportunity to act as Chairman of this committee.

It has been a learning experience for me and have found it to be a very rewarding and challenging experience.

I say rewarding as it has given me the opportunity to see the overall picture of the successes of the Command Branches in running their Poppy and Remembrance Programs. The overall financial contributions to our Veterans and our Youth is simply outstanding.

I should also recognize the time and effort that Command staff put in to assisting the Branches with the successful operation and completion of the poppy campaign.

When I refer to this experience as being a challenge, I think it is important to pass on the concerns and recommendations that are associated with this program.

First I would like to point out that all of the procedures of running a successful poppy campaign are set out in the Poppy Manuel. It is a MUST for all poppy chairman to read and follow the proper procedures. These procedures have been established in past and are in place to ensure that all poppy funds are spent and accounted for, as these are not Branch funds. They are held in trust and administered by the Branches on behalf of the citizens that donated to our cause to assist our Veterans and other designated special uses.

The staff and members of the Poppy Remembrance committee should not be condemned nor criticized for following the proper procedures and guidelines that have been set up and approved. if recommendations to the policies need to be changed then so be it. If changes can be made to make a program run more smoothly.

The same concerns were in my last report to the Executive Committee, however, will bring them forward once again.

As of January 24/2019 I have conducted a joint review of all of the Branch Status reports of the Poppy Trust Fund. A complete review of these reports was also conducted prior to my mine by Comrade Valerie Mitchell-Veinotte.

From these reviews I would like to note the following:

- 1. Notices to Branches have been sent out requesting clarification of other local expenses D5 (attach breakdown) on the status report. Documentation was not received to support the expenditure. Some Branches have now received second notices.
- 2. Some Branches have not submitted special use applications for expenditures which simply means that without the proper form submitted there is no record on file of the general membership authorizing or knowing of the use of these funds as required.
- 3. In some cases funds have been issued that clearly do not fall under the guidelines and the Branch will have to repay the poppy account from the general account.
- I do not wish to disclose any specific Branch concerns in my report, however, I do wish to discuss the above in greater detail with the executive council members and ask for direction with regards to outstanding issues.

I have conducted a Poppy Seminar since our last meeting hosted by Kentville Legion. The topic was based on "How to run a Successful Poppy Campaign." It was well attended and attendees thought beneficial. More of these sessions are needed especially for those that take on the Branch Poppy Chair position.

I am also in the process of contacting the Branch Poppy Chairman to assist with those outstanding issues that they have been notified of through the Command Office. This is only a follow up from notices to ensure that the Branches are informed and to ensure compliance with the guidelines of the Poppy Manuel.

I am sure that the Branch Presidents, Zone Commanders as well as the District Commanders will assist the Branches in any way possible to ensure that all Poppy Trust Fund expenditures meet Public Scrutiny.

In conclusion all entries for Posters, Poems and Essays Contest have been judged and special thanks to all of the judges that participated.

ABMO #'s 45, 55, 69 were used to notify all Branches that the date of submissions to the Resolutions Committee were due 07 January 2019.

I will refer to the Resolutions as they were received from the Branches:

#1 This Resolution makes reference to quorums, delegate attendance and voting at District meetings. This appears to be a case of the District Branch Presidents not doing their job. We should not change the rules because members of certain branches within some Districts are not doing their part by attending monthly or quarterly meetings. If you look in the Ritual Manual under the wording for the installation of the President, he certifies, "to ensure that your branch is represented at Zone and/or District meetings". Then look in the Leadership Manual, Chapter 5 and it reads, "The President shall ensure that the branch participates in Zone and District rallies, conventions and meetings as well as Provincial and Dominion Conventions.".

Therefore, this committee is Non-Concurred on this Resolution

#2 This Resolution makes reference to Districts being abolished due to low branch membership turn out at meetings, duplication on information and Districts not running smoothly. This goes along with Resolution #1, in that the District Commander and the Branch Presidents are not doing their job or getting along. We should not change the rules of the Districts or NS/NU Command because members of certain branches within some Districts are not doing their part by attending monthly or quarterly meetings. Again If you look in the Ritual and Insignia Manual under the wording for the installation of the President, it certifies, "to ensure that your branch is represented at Zone and/or **District** meetings". Then look in the Leadership Manual, Chapter 5 and it reads, "The President shall ensure that the branch participates in Zone and **District** rallies, conventions and meetings as well as Provincial and Dominion Conventions.".

Therefore this committee is Non - Concurred on this resolution

#3 This Resolution makes reference to the shortage of volunteers and that paid Members/Employees be allowed to serve on the Branch Executive. I believe this rule was put in place to protect the branches from potential problems due to paid employees having too much say in matters related to their employment. Paid employees should not have a say on matters related to finance or employment, at least on the voting side of things.

Therefore, this committee is Non - Concurred on this Resolution

#4 This Resolution has to do NS/NU Command paying the expenses of the District Commanders to attend Dominion Conventions. All District Commanders are the voice for their own Districts, as delegates for their members and Branches. In some Districts within NS/NU Command, the Zone Commanders are the voice, it seems, and feel that the Zone Commander is a better representative of the branches than a District Commander. Some Districts support the District Commanders in their support for District financial expenses with a yearly due, while other Districts support the Zone Commanders with a Zone Fund with each branch contributing a certain amount per year based on their membership as of Dec 31st of the previous year. Rather than Command considering a large additional expense every second year, the District Commanders within our Command should consider doing something like this. I have polled the other Provincial Commands on this, and Saskatchewan, Alberta, Manitoba and Ontario assist the District Commanders with their expenses when going to the National Convention only, While Newfoundland, British Columbia, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia/Nunavut do not, I have not heard back from PEI, Quebec also, Another point is that only Alberta and Nova Scotia pay the Zone and District Commanders a yearly or by-annual stipend.

Therefore, this committee is Non - Concurred on this Resolution

#5 This Resolution has to do with the Command Executive Council expending retained earnings for projects (Paws for Thoughts) in excess of \$250,000. It contradicts existing NS/NU Command By-law 602 which states the Executive Council shall have the power to administer the business and activities of the Command. It also contradicts article 803 which describes our capital reserve fund of \$100,000. This is not a legal Resolution according to NS/NU Command By-law 313 B which states that Resolutions to convention shall deal with amendments to our existing By-laws, there is no existing By-law addressing this specific topic, unless we are amending the By-Law Manual. Article VII paragraph 706 of the NS/NU Command By-Laws, "The Constitution & By-Laws Committee shall examine and report upon all proposed amendments to these By-Laws. Resolutions can also add to our existing bylaws, however, this document requests that the Executive Council should be responsible to write that bylaw. This item should be considered as a POLICY item and not a By-Law or Resolution item and therefore should be referred to the By-laws and Policy Committee for their review and brought back to Executive Council for a decision in May prior to convention.

Therefore, this committee is Non - Concurred on this Resolution

This Resolution refers to the Poppy Fund, for the purchase of markers, flags to honour veterans. As Per the "Don'ts" of Poppy Trust Funds" Paragraph 501 iii)f., of the Poppy Manual — "The purchase of headstones, grave markers, memorial plaques for cenotaphs". The Last Post Fund assists veterans in financial need for costs associated with burial. This extra cost of a marker or flag should be a personal choice of the family. The Legion currently sells metal crosses to acknowledge veteran graves, some branches give these away while others sell them to the families for a minimal cost.

Therefore, this committee is Non - Concurred on this Resolution

#7 This Resolution has to do with Dominion Command reducing expenses by limiting the number of Past Presidents to three (3) in paying their travel expenses and per deems to attend Dominion Conventions. Past Presidents of Dominion Command, if not a delegate from their individual branch, are accredited delegates to the Convention. Dominion Command should follow the lead of Provincial Commands and exercise financial restraint and reduce costs, as per per diums, taxes are from members in the various Provincial Commands.

B Each Branch in Cape Breton District A and Nunavut District G shall be entitled to voting delegates at a district meeting based on the following formula:

Three (3) delegates for one hundred (100) members or less;

Il Four (4) delegates from one hundred and one (101) to one hundred and fifty (150) members;

III Five (5) delegates from one hundred and fifty one (151) to two hundred (200) members; and

NS/NU Command By-Laws P age 11

IV Six (6) delegates for two hundred and one (201) or more members with a maximum to be six delegates.

C Each such delegate must be a member in good standing of the Branch he represents.

D Voting delegates at a District F meeting shall consist of the District F Commander, the Past District F Commander, District F Secretary/Treasurer, Zone 14 Commander, Zone 15 Commander, Zone 14 Deputy Zone Commander and the Zone 15 Deputy Zone Commander. A special meeting will be called prior to <u>Provincial Convention for the election of District officers at which voting delegates will be two (2)</u> members in good standing per Branch.

be it further resolved: That paragraph 410 be amended to read:

A A District meeting other than for the election of District officers shall be as laid down in the Terms of Reference of the District, provided that if a majority of the Branches in the District forward a written request to the District Commander asking that a District meeting be held and stating the purpose for which the meeting is requested, the District Commander shall within twenty-one (21) days from the date of receipt of the requisition call a Special District Meeting to deal with the business stated in the requisition

D Districts shall hold individual District meetings a minimum of 3 times per year.



Be it further resolved: The notification process for such expense shall be through Resolution presented at a Biannual Convention, or if the expenditure is of a time-sensitive matter, then the Command shall use the ABMO process to notify all District/Zones/Branches within the Command. A minimum of ten (10) day notice to the District/Zone/Branches is required prior to the vote of Command Executive Council Members.





# VETERANS SERVICE RECOGNITION BOOK REPORT TO EXECUTIVE COUNCIL 09 FEBRUARY 2019

The 2018 edition, Volume 14, has generated revenue for this Command of approximately \$87,420.64 as per our December financial statements, approximately \$2500 above budgeted figures.

The telephone campaign for the 2019 edition (Volume 15), administered by Fenety Marketing, has begun. I remind Council in every one of my reports that this project plays a huge and vital role in the financial picture of this Command and therefore all Officers of Command should be made aware of the various timings involved in this project so that if questions arise from your Zone Commanders or branches you will be able to answer them.

The Executive Director and I met with Mark Fenety on 5 Dec 2018 to discuss a new 5-year contract between NS/NU Command and Fenety Marketing for the continued production of our VSRB. The new contract is advantageous to our Command in that, we will now receive a \$2500 per year signing bonus, and the minimum net earnings guarantee will rise to \$50,000.

Receipt of Veteran submissions for our book from branches across our Command has unfortunately dropped to a mere trickle so far this winter. So, I am requesting that you address this issue during your District meetings and ask your Zone Commanders to do the same at their Zone meetings. The success of this project is **ALL** of our responsibility, not just the committee Chairman's.

#### VETERANS OUTREACH PROGRAM REPORT TO EXECUTIVE COUNCIL 09 FEBRUARY 2019

Comrades, NS/NUC's VO Programs and initiatives continue to be very active and involved within our Veteran community.

We continue, through the Executive Director's office, to be in contact with, and in full support of, our OSI Special Section, our Healing on the Fly program, our OSISS Family Retreat initiative, our PTSD Art Program, the Veteran Memorial Medical Center initiative, and the Paws Fur Thought Service Dog program.

At this time, I would like to have the E.D. bring us up to date regarding the Veteran Memorial Medical Center initiative.

We received an after-action report from the organizers of the OSISS Family Retreat initiative, which this Council supports financially, informing us of 2-4 November 2018 retreat. Highlights of the retreat are as follows:

- Location was Inn on the Lake in Fall River N.S. The venue was described as being private with good accommodations and plentiful and nutritious meals.
- The funding of the event fell within budget.
- There were 23 participants attending the 2018 retreat, travelling from 1.5 to 5 hours to attend. Also attending were 3 FPSC's (Family Peer Support Councilors), 2 facilitators, and 6 presenters and community partners over the 2-and-a-half-day program.
- The majority of the participants had never attended a resilience program, nor had the
  opportunity to meet with peers from around the province Sydney, Pictou, New
  Glasgow, HRM, the Annapolis Valley, Bridgewater and Cornwallis areas were
  represented.
- The participants were given the opportunity to participate in a personalized event as individuals, separate and apart, from their injured Veteran / soldier, and given a firsthand experience of the benefits of self-care without guilt, shame, resentment, frustration, abandonment or distractions.

Paws Fur Thought (PFT) continues to move forward with approximately 120 dogs and handlers matched to date. In November 2018, Comrade Tofflemire represented our Command at Dominion Executive Council (DEC) and brought the other Commands up to date regarding our \$250,000 donation to PFT. On 12 December 2018 Comrade Tofflemire represented the VOP at our Command headquarters during the presentation of these funds to PFT, as VO Chair I was unable to attend this event.

As always, NS/NUC remains very appreciative of the financial contributions of our branches towards the VOP, and we look forward to the further advancement of our programs and initiatives in the coming months and years.

The service works to achieve this goal by providing multi-lingual access to information and referral through both a hearing-impaired accessible phone number and a website.

The 211 call centre is staffed with Information and Referral Specialists who are fully trained to deal with the most complex and sensitive questions and how to get to the real issue affecting a caller.

The service helps Nova Scotians by reducing the frustration of trying to find the right community or social resource across multiple sources. In turn, it allows those same organizations and government agencies to rely on highly-trained 211 staff

to handle inquiries they might once have had to spend valuable time assessing and redirecting. It will also allow them to quickly direct people to services that are outside of their organization's scope or area of expertise, and possibly connect with other service providers whose goals and mandates complement their own.

The end result is a collaborative system that will continually evolve to meet the needs of Nova Scotians as they look for help in their communities.
