Sir,

Recently, one of our two eldest members, Comrade John (Jock) McStay, a decorated World War II soldier who was a member of the force that freed the Netherlands, brought to the memberships' attention a situation that needs the attention and support of ALL Canadians. On April 9<sup>th</sup>, 2017 a documentary entitled "Searching for Vimy's Lost Soldiers" highlighted the fact that there are 44 Canadian soldiers, who died during the battle, who still lay in a mine crater under potato fields on the Vimy battlefield and that a single regional French bureaucrat had refused to allow Canadian military historian Norm Christie to continue his search for these men.

Mr. Christie has personally raised tens of thousands of dollars from ordinary Canadians to conduct a search for the specific unmarked mine crater (CA40) where these men lay. Mr. Christie had the permission of the farmers who owned the land, and also the support and cooperation of the Municipal Government of Thélus and many other organizations in France. He had recently pinpointed a precise section of these fields where the remains of these men most probably lay.

Despite much support locally in France, and at home in Canada, the action of a single regional French bureaucrat has put a stop order on any continued excavation – the motivation of this bureaucrat is unclear.

As a Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion in your ridings, I am asking you today to raise the issue in the Houses of Parliament and to ask the Prime Minister and the Minister of Global Affairs to ask that the Canadian Government make a formal request of the Government of France to intervene in this matter and to secure Mr. Christie permission to continue his search.

These 44 Canadian soldiers of World War 1 deserve a proper burial after 100 years – would it not be wonderful to achieve this in the Centennial Year of the Battle for VIMY Ridge?
