NS/NU Command Executive Council Veterans Services Report

Our bureau is dealing with Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) disability applications, reviews/appeals and when requested assist with Benevolent fund applications.

Since 1 Jan and as of 29 April 2022:

- We are handling 268 open/active VAC files (note 1)
- We had 56 favorable VAC disability claim decisions.
- We have been responsible for \$4,520,979.92 dollars awarded. Which is the equivalent to financial lump sums for VAC disability claims. As important to these monetary pay outs are the medical benefits given to each person for the rest of their life.
- Withdrawn claims 35 (note 2)
- We are now allowing clients to come in for interviews and we are using standard COVID precautions.

Note 1 - This includes Disability claims (first applications and departmental reviews), but also such things as Veterans Independence Program applications, Caregiver Recognition Benefit applications, Survivor applications, etc.

Note 2 - Claims are withdrawn for various reasons such as Veterans moving and not forwarding new contact information or Veterans not following through with their responsibilities in the process after an excess of a 5 months of assistance.

Since 1 Jan 2021, our Bureau Service Officers participated in Monthly National Service Officer teleconferences. The Bi-Annual Service Officer Professional Development in Charlottetown PE that was postponed until 2022 looks like it's going ahead this fall.

On behalf of the Command Service Bureau, thanks to all Branch Service Officers, Branch Executive and members for their dedication and determination. Also, to the Command Executive for their unwavering support. The work of the Service Bureau would not be accomplished without all your assistance.

We are in the process of arranging to have each District provide the dates of their upcoming meeting. The reason being that the Sub Executive can attend the meeting to allow all members can meet the Sub Executive.

With Branches opening, I am asking District Commander if there are any Branches that has good news stories that they share to help others may take part with planning an event or learning how. There are Branches that are struggling within our Command, if we can give them the "how to" tools, it may be effective. The constant changes with our world today, I ask that you remain strong and continue to advocate for our Veterans. Thank you for all your continued

The Royal Canadian Legion Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command Report to Executive Council May 14 2022

The day to day business of NS/NU Command continues to be affected appropriately.

Meetings with National Directors and when designated, National Committee meetings, are ongoing.

Since my last report of February 26 2022 follow up to the 2020-2021 Branch annual poppy trust fund reports has finally been completed, year end completed with audited financial reports for 2021 accepted by NSNU Command Sub Executive, positions of Bookkeeper/Clerk and Command Service Officer posted, resumes vetted and interviews arranged.

I have met with Wheels for the Wyse, newly appointed SISSIP representative for central NS, Camp Maple Leaf, 7 Arts, Service Manager of CAF Transition Center, Halifax, OSISS, the Veterans Transition Network, Veteran Farm Project, VAC Veteran Service Team Manager and contact with the office of NS Minister responsible for long term care.

The conversation with the Ministers office was to clarify the NS government budgeted item "\$11 million to extend or convert more than 190 new long term care spaces, including Veterans Affairs spaces, to help create more bed capacity and support patient flow." I was advised that the intention is to temporarily convert VA spaces as many are considered chronically vacant. I asked that the Minister be made aware that vacancies exist due to limited criteria for eligibility and that The Royal Canadian Legion has long advocated that eligibility be expanded to include all Veterans. The matter was raised in the meeting with VAC Veterans Service Team Manager with a commitment to bring NSNU Commands' concern to VAC Area Director and to the VAC Itc co-ordinator. Along with other Veteran centric organizations, NSNU Command will witness to the NS Standing Committee on Veterans Affairs late May and although the topic is Veteran homelessness and transition services, I hope to create an opportunity to bring this issue to the Committees' attention following up with a letter to each Committee member from President McRury on the seriousness of the matter and, with permission of President McRury communication to all Branches to have them press local MLA on the issue. The Veterans Outreach Programs of NS/NU Command are constantly evolving around our Veterans requirements in order to remain relevant. We must keep pace with the changes that are affecting the lives of our Veterans and their families. A few of our programs that have come to the forefront over the years are going strong and are supported strongly by Veterans, for in- person and virtual meetings they are thriving. We also have started doing virtual get togethers, such as the Veterans Coffee Break. Here is a snap shot of what is going on around the Command through Veteran outreach.

OSISS

The Operational Stress Injury Social Support program celebrated 20 years of service in 2021 to our active Canadian Armed Forces members, our veteran community and their families. OSISS is a peer support program partially funded both by the Department of National Defence and Veterans Affairs Canada.

They provide peer support to members, veterans and their families who experience symptoms from an operational stress injury (ie PTSD, anxiety, depression, and/or addiction) as a result of service. We have two types of coordinators in the program; a peer support coordinator who is a military veteran who has personally experienced a mental health injury due to their service; and, family peer support coordinators, who have lived experience in supporting a loved one with an OSI. Because of similiar lived experience, they are able to establish trusting, confidential professional relationships with peers and support them in a non-judgmental, empathetic way.

In addition to peer support via phone, text, email, in-person one-on-one meetings as well as group meetings, OSISS provides resource information to peers. They know their communities and the resources available within them, including stakeholders. The

Royal Canadian Legion NS/NU Command has been an exceptional support and advocate of the OSIS program.

Long Term Care and VAC Contract Beds

The \$11M announced investments this coming fiscal year in the provincial budget are to support temporary bed capacity in the provincial LTC system while our new 2,500 new beds are being built, and to support access and flow pressures on our hospitals due to COVID-19 impacts. Not all of the funds (and 190 beds) are specific to Veterans Affairs contract beds being accessed by provincial LTC waitlist clients, the funds are also supporting private assisted living and residential care facility beds to be temporarily staffed and available for provincial nursing home level of care. The Department of Seniors and Long Term Care will continue to partner with NSHA and Veterans Affairs Canada to determine availability of vacant contract beds for this initiative. The province

has indicated that any VAC contract beds utilized to expand capacity is temporary and does not include taking away any contract beds needed for war Veterans at Camp Hill under the Preferred Admission Initiative.

We will continue to work with NSHA and VAC to make decisions in line with their current eligibility criteria and associated capacity.

Heros Mending on the Fly

HMOTF NS is working away with fly tying programs in both Greenwood area and HRM with 8 participants in each location. They are over half way through this phase of our program and participants in both locations are grasping the art of fly tying very well. Much better this year being able to meet in person vice tying via zoom. HRM group meets in Bedford Legion and Valley group meets at Greenwood MFRC.

They just finalized scheduling of the casting clinic which will be held at Graves Island Provincial Park on 7 May with the 8th as rain day. This location is somewhat central for both our groups to make travel simple. Once again we have Lewis Hinks and Rene Aucoin (International fly casting instructors) helping out with this phase of our program. This clinic is open to Veterans and their families beyond the group that participates in the tying workshops.

We have our participants fishing trip scheduled for 23-26 June, staying at the Normaway Inn in the Margaree. We have confirmation from guide Paddy Poirier that he will be available and donating his services again this year. We have also secured a visit to Atlantic Salmon Museum on the Saturday afternoon. We have received some support from local Legions and indication that more is coming. This is great and will hopefully ensure we are able to facilitate our program without cutting anything. We could not provide this program for our Veterans without the support we get from NS/Nunavut Command and now local Legions. Very grateful for your generousity.

OSI/BSO

Operational Stress Injury (OSI) is defined by The Royal Ottawa Mental Health Centre as any persistent psychological difficulty resulting from operational duties performed while serving in the Canadian Forces or as a member of the RCMP. "Difficulties may occur during combat duties, after serving in a warzone or in peacekeeping missions. Problems may also arise following other traumatic or serious events not specific to combat such as domestic operations, disaster relief, aid to civil power, sexual assault or harassment etc. OSIs often present as Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), Moral Injury, other anxiety disorders, depression, substance use disorders and other conditions that may interfere with daily functioning.

BSO Legion OSI is a national, member driven, peer-support network, providing eligible Legion members with the opportunity to support, volunteer and advocate for Veterans' mental health. Legion Members who are Veterans or immediate family members of Veterans can join BSO Legion OSI to show their support and volunteer in their community.

About 1/5 of Canadian Veterans experience a diagnosed mental health disorder at some time during their lives.

Up to 10% of Veterans in Canada will experience post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), while others may experience at least some of the associated symptoms.

Nearly 1 in 5 Canadian Forces spouses surveyed in 2008/2009 reported being diagnosed with depression at some point during their partner's military career.

Afghanistan as an example

73% of deployed members had 1 tour of Afghanistan, 21% had 2 tours and 6% had 3 or more.

90% of Afghanistan deployed members were males, 10% females.

12% of CAF Veterans in receipt of VAC benefits have a disability benefit related to service in Afghanistan.

55% of CAF Veterans, with a disability benefit related to service in Afghanistan, are in receipt of a VAC pension/award for Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

23% of members deployed to Afghanistan, are in receipt of a VAC pension/award for a mental health condition related to their service in Afghanistan.

19% of members deployed to Afghanistan, are in receipt of a VAC pension/award for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) related to their service in Afghanistan

Buddy Check Coffee

What is Buddy Check Coffee? BCC is a very simple concept, a scheduled regular get together of veterans that is coordinated and co-marketed by a local host who is a member of BSO Legion OSI. It provides peer support for veterans. BCC is held in a location chosen by the local HOST. It can be a local Legion Branch or a commercial coffee shop. We are here to serve all veterans. Regarding First Responders, that is a local call by hosts and participants. We feel most veterans have an affinity and common ground with first responders but there are some that do not. A few places around the Command that are doing or starting a BBC are, Branch 155 in Wedgeport they had a segment on the local radio station to talk about Buddy Check Coffee, they are going to try Veterans Coffees later this month to see if we can get Veterans out to meet each other. Branch 78 Dominion meet every Tuesday from 7-9. If other Branchs in the Command are doing something similar please let me know.

Op Vet Build

Team Leaders: Must be a veteran/current serving member of the Canadian Armed Forces, RCMP or Allied Force veteran as well as be a Legion member enrolled in BSO Legion OSI. Their role is to coordinate meeting times and space with their local Legion Branch to facilitate Op VetBuild meetings. They are also responsible for securing donations through the poppy fund and through Op VetBuild fundraising/donation drive activities. During Op VetBuild meetings they will carry out host duties, introduce new members, assist participants, provide a safe environment and above all, have fun doing

it! They will also be responsible to the Operation VetBuild National Program Coordinator for the following:

Provide a quarterly report on donations collected (kits, supplies, cash, poppy funds), report on the number of attendees at the meetings,

Provide photos of the meetings for use in social media/marketing as well as of proof that your program is operational,

Be a member of the OP VetBuild Team Leader Group on Facebook to have access to various promotion/marketing materials as well as share experiences that can benefit the other team leaders and help maintain program consistency across the country.

Participants: Must be a veteran/current serving member of the Canadian Armed Forces, RCMP or Allied Force veteran, an immediate family member of the above (parent, spouse, sibling, child), a Law Enforcement Officer that has served on an overseas mission. First Responders can participate in the program, but do not fall under the Poppy fund for resources. Participants do not need to be Legion members. Children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

Branch 155 Wedgeport had Craig Hood the National Program Coordinator talked about Op Vet Build on the local radio station, Branch 78 Dominion meets every Tuesday from 7-9, Branch 44 Chester will be meeting 4 April, 25 April and 2 May, Branch 132 Inverness is in the starting up point and are receiving donations at this time.
