There are two adjustments to be made to the budget. Line 5360 - the Finance Committee budgeted \$4500 for electricity; this amount was not carried over to the new spreadsheet (this was an error.) Line 5370 – the budgeted amount for insurance was based on last year's totals. The quote for this year's insurance has been received which reflects as increase in cost due to a yearly increase and two claims. Three different options for renewal were presented.

NS/NU Convention 2021

NS/NU Command President Marion Fryday-Cook outlined that a decision was required on whether to hold a 2021 Convention or to postpone until 2022. Under current Covid-19 regulations the host Branch, Colchester Branch 026 has informed the NS/NU Convention Committee that they are able to accommodate 65 people upstairs and 45 downstairs. They feel that the restrictions required will prohibit them from making any profit. NS/NU President Marion Fryday-Cook asked for discussion and input. NS/NU Command Executive Director Valerie Mitchell-Veinotte provided the meeting with the following numbers for Convention: Potential for 305 delegates (by By-Law), 4 guests and 2 members of staff. In 2019 there were 163 delegates, 14 observers with a total of 184 in attendance.

2020 Remembrance Day Ceremonies

NS/NU Presented Marion Fryday-Cook informed the meeting that directives have been issued from Dominion Command regarding Legion conducted Remembrance ceremonies.

Rafflebox

NS/NU President Marion Fryday-Cook explained that Rafflebox provides a platform for non-profits to create and manage online raffles and 50/50 fundraisers. Lunenburg Branch 023 is participating in this along with 7 other Branches looking to join them. 12 percent of the profit goes to the Branch. They have applied for a licence through Alcohol and Gaming, 2.13% will be paid to them. NS/NU District E Commander Don McCumber will provide the Rafflebox Procedural Rules to NS/NU President Marion Fryday-Cook for consideration in sharing with Branches.

Disbursement of Funds from National Command

NS/NU President Marion Fryday-Cook advised that the second allotment of funds from National Command has been received. District Commanders are to forward Branch requests for assistance through the Executive Director or Branches may forward to E.D. directly. District and Zone Commanders will be consulted and requests will be considered on a case by case basis by the Finance Committee.

NS/NU Command Sports Committee Chairman Robert Hoeg reported that Dominion Command does not yet know whether they will be hosting 2021 National events. He explained that the Provincial Cribbage and Dart and Pool associations hold their own accounts and that funds that would have normally been used for participants to attend the National events are being held in those accounts. Once the names of the 2020 winners for Darts and Cribbage have been provided to Dominion Command, they will send out the crests, pins and a letter that would have usually been received at the Nationals.

An ABMO will be sent out informing Branches of the decision to curtail all Provincial sanctioned playoffs until direction is received from National Command as to how and when they are hosting national events.

However once taxes and a deduction for Gamblers Anonymous Nova Scotia has been taken the amount received is 21.522%.

She also communicated that during these unprecedented times training seminars have been cancelled and that moving forward hopefully some virtual training sessions can be scheduled.

She asked that everyone review their duties as laid out in the By-Law and Policy Manuals. She asked that District Commanders use the District Commander Report Form and keep reports precise as opposed to listing every Branch. Zone Commanders are required to send their reports to the District Commanders who then report to the Executive Council. Reports need to be sent in by the deadline, if there is no report submit it as such, "no report." NS/NU Command President Marion Fryday-Cook has been requested by Dominion Command to send out a series of questions which will be distributed to the District Commanders and are to be completed by the end of September. She asked that District Commanders encourage Branches to push the Federal Government for a financial aid package for Legion branches by sending the Member Outreach Letter to Ministers of Parliament. She also reinforced that District Commanders remind members to please be polite when calling into the Command Office. She thanked the staff for their outstanding work.

Our bureau is dealing with Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) disability applications, reviews/appeals and when requested assisting with Benevolent fund applications.

Since 1 Jan and as of 1 Sep 2020:

- we are handling 351 open/active VAC files (note 1)
- we made 40 home visits (note 2)
- we had 79 VAC disability claims withdrawn (note 3)
- we had 192 favorable and 13 unfavorable VAC disability claim decisions
- we have been responsible for approx. \$ 13.7 million dollars awarded. Which is the equivalent to
 financial lump sums for VAC disability claims including 8 new monthly pensions and/or
 increases. As important to these monetary pay-outs are the medical benefits given to each
 person for the rest of their life.

Note 1 - This includes Disability claims (first applications and departmental reviews), but also such things as Veterans Independence Program applications, Caregiver Recognition Benefit applications, Survivor applications, etc.

Note 2 - Complicated VAC cases which are Command clients who request to work on VAC forms in their home as they are not able to travel to our office due to mobility/medical issues. Also, weekly Veteran Farm Project deliveries between 11 Jul and 19 Sep 2019.

Note 3 - Claims are withdrawn for various reasons such as Veterans moving and not forwarding new contact information or Veterans not following through with their responsibilities in the process after an excess of 5 months of assistance.

Since 1 Jan 2020, our Bureau Service Officers participated in National Service Officer teleconferences. They had to postpone a meeting with representatives of the Veterans Review and Appeal Board and the Annual Service Officer Training in our Windsor and Baddeck Branch's. The Bi-Annual Service Officer Professional Development from 26-30 Oct in Charlottetown PE was postponed until 2021.

On behalf of the Command Service Bureau, thanks to all the Branch Service Officers, Branch Executive and members for their dedication and determination through these unprecedented times. Also, to the Command Executive for their unwavering support, so we may remain functioning effectively through this Pandemic. The work of the Service Bureau would not be accomplished without all your assistance.

The Royal Canadian Legion Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command Service Bureau President's Report Executive Council September 2020

These past 6 months have certainly been difficult for all of us and I want you all to know how much I appreciate the hard work that has gone on across our command to reopen branches that have decided to open. There are many branches that have yet to reopen but they are still working diligently to update, paint and prepare their branch for their eventual reopen date. I also understand your frustration in the constant changes in the government regulations that have evolved over the past few months. With so many changes, it certainly was hard to keep up and I thank you for your patience. Please keep following the Social Distancing Rules, wear a mask and keep everyone safe.

Since we last met in late May, the Command office has made a few changes. Barriers for staff, hand sanitizers and other Covid-19 protocols have been in place and I would like to thank the staff for their meticulous cleaning regiment daily to keep everyone safe.

The Dominion President has written two letters to the Prime Minister asking for help for Legions across Canada. This action has not been addressed by the government to date so a letter writing campaign to MP's across Canada will begin shortly. The letter will be sent to all Commands and then to all branches and Dominion President Irvine is asking that all members send a copy of the letter of support to their local Members of Parliament.

A class action lawsuit has been filed by Dominion Command and Ontario Command against PIB/ Aviva for loss of income insurance. Please refer to ABMO # 45 for more information.

I had the pleasure of delivering a Farm Project Basket to a veteran and their family all summer and was thoroughly impressed by the team, and the farm when we toured their location. My heartfelt thanks go out to Jessica, Steve and the rest of the team of veterans who work so hard in support of other veterans. 30 families were supported this season and in late August, boxes of fresh and frozen vegetables, pickles and preserves, fresh bread and other goodies were delivered to more than 20 veterans. I would like to thank the District D Service Officers, Comrades Steadman, Conrad and Mitchell-Veinotte for making the delivery of these boxes possible. A job well done.

I have attended Zoom conferences for Membership, PRO, Provincial/Territorial President's Round table, Federal Funding discussions, and the DEC Governance Committee. All have been highly informative. It is amazing to be able to discuss issues with comrades from across the country.

Comrade Conrad and I attended a ceremony to mark the 75th Anniversary of V-J Day and the end of WWII. It was a moving, albeit small ceremony and I had the honour of reading the Act of Remembrance. The National Veteran's Week poster was unveiled and the family of one of the veterans on the poster was there to assist the Minister of Veterans Affairs with this task.

DEC Report

Executive Council

September 2020

The DEC zoom meeting was held over a two-day period on June 6-7, 2020.

Comrade Irvine praised the branches across Canadian who have continued to support Remembrance and Veterans during the Covid-19 Crisis. Many branches held commemorative ceremonies either virtually or in small groups for the 75th Anniversary of the Battle of the Atlantic, the 75th Anniversary of the Liberation of Netherlands, the End of WWII in Europe. The Dominion President also thanked all the Provincial/Territorial staff for their hard work. Stolen Valour remains an important focus and we must all be vigilant to ensure this does not happen. It will be dealt with swiftly by his office.

Finances are holding their own as there have been savings due to the cancellation of the 2020 Convention, Membership Sports and Track and Field. The new practice of Zoom meetings has also help to off set costs.

Veterans, Services and Seniors Committee:

DEC approved the "Leave the Streets Behind 2020-2025 plan to eradicate veteran's homelessness. DEC approved the second year of \$10,000 funding for Project Trauma Support to resume when PTS resumes after the Covid crisis allows.

Poppy

Funding to Support our Troops Special Needs Program, The Youth Camp Program, Operation Veteran, Heroes Mending on the Fly and Virtual Wall of Honour and Remembrance were approved for 2020.

DEC approved Changes to the Poppy manual section 403.ii.e with regards to the purchase of public safety items necessary to protect our veterans and members up to a maximum of \$500 from the Poppy Trust Funds.

Membership committee recommended and DEC approved that "New members wishing to join the Royal Canadian Legion be offered the opportunity to join a local branch online. The Veterans Welcome Program continues to grow with over 2000 new members in the first three months of 2020. Please look at the new Members Perks as there are many incentives for members from a large group of businesses. Go to Legion.ca to see what your membership offers you.

Ritual and Awards

TVS and bars and ribbon and BSO OSI bar have been approved. Legion Informal Dress was approved.

Constitution and Laws: the following items were approved by DEC

GBL 1001 be amended to: "A provincial convention for each Provincial Command shall be held annually or biennially as determined by the Provincial Command, at such time and place as the Provincial Command may decide. However, in exceptional circumstances with the consent of Dominion Command, the interval between provincial conventions may be extended as appropriate."

Convention Committee 2020/2022 Conventions – Rescheduling: Due to the effects of the COVID-19 Pandemic DEC voted unanimously to reschedule the 2020 Dominion Convention from August 2020 to 12-19 August 2021. In addition to the rescheduling of the 2020 Dominion Convention DEC also approved unanimously to reschedule the 2022 Dominion Convention to 23-29 August 2024.

Legion National Foundation

Digital Poppy

All monies donated to the Digital Poppy will go directly to the Legion National Foundation. Receipts will be given out at the national level.

Further to the DEC meeting, the DEC met on August 8, 2020 by Teleconference and the following was approved.

MOTION 1: Branch Elections

At the teleconference on 20 Mar 20, DEC directed that Branch elections and transitions to a new executive, and branch by-laws / regulations pertaining to branch elections, be suspended pending a return to normal branch operations.

DEC Decision, 12 Aug 20: The authority for holding Branch elections is now delegated to Provincial Commands / International Zones effective immediately.

MOTION 2: Article III Proceedings

Background: At the teleconference on 20 Mar 20, DEC directed that all current and new complaints be held in abeyance and suspended the 45-day requirement under sub-section 308.d of the GBLs. Further, at the teleconference on 4 Apr 20, DEC directed that all timelines in Article III provisions governing the complaint and appeal processes be suspended effective immediately (5 April 2020). Pending the reopening of branches and command offices, the date for reinstatement was to be determined by the Dominion President when, in his sole discretion, it was felt to be warranted.

DEC Decision, 12 Aug 20: The temporary measures will remain in place as DEC decided not to reinstate Article III proceedings and timelines. All current and new complaints and appeals will continue to be held in abeyance. Reinstatement of Article III proceedings will be reviewed again prior to the November 2020 DEC meeting.

We continue to monitor the budget variation on a month by month basis. While line by line figures change, the bottom number of the budget remains the same. We have two items up for discussion on the budget. One being the new insurance rate and the electricity.

The Finance and Building Committee recommended to the Executive Council that the GIC certificate 1DHXDG book value of \$80,000.00 be reinvested with Scotiabank at a special offer rate 0.90% interest for 9 months with the interest earned on the matured certificate be allocated to Veterans Assistance/Benevolent Fund. Executive Council voted in favor; this action has been completed.

Also recommended by the Committee; that the 23,500.00 designated for National Convention in the 2020 budget be invested in a GIC with Scotiabank at the special offer rate of 0.90% interest for 9 months. Executive Council voted in favor; this action has been completed.

The battery backup for the Bookkeeper/ Clerk computer has been purchased however the surge protectors are on back order. The Service Officers have received their new client chairs for their office.

It was brought to the Committee's attention that the Executive Director's laptop which is 10 years old, have side ports not working. The laptop has had numerous repairs .The side ports are required especially since we have been doing Zoom meetings. On our Zoom meetings if you call in, it is difficult to hear others, we have purchased an external speaker to aid with hearing. This requires a side port, as well any external hard drives or flash drive require ports. This laptop is also used at conventions, it is awkward, heavy to transport due to the old model. With ports not working properly it is difficult to complete the necessary tasks. The Committee has requested the Executive Director get three quotes for a new laptop that is more efficient, light

weight for travel with ports that will assist in completing the jobs required. We as a Committee are currently in discussion regarding the laptop.

The initial repairs to the front entrance and boardroom entrance have been completed, the work consisted of:

- Remove trim returns on both sides of doorways
- Supply and install solid wood returns
- Paint new finishes to match existing
- Supply and install new door sweeps on exterior of doors

Cost for repair was \$966.00 plus HST.

The Executive Director brought to the Committee's attention that the security lock on the front door was not working properly. Due to the fact that this is a security issue, the Executive Director contacted a lock repair company to have the work done for the safety and security of the building. This repair has been done as well; cost was \$115.00.

The Executive Director Comrade Valerie has applied for the Accessibility Grant. This grant is through a federal accessibility grant program. There has been no confirmation to date on our success of the grant, however we will keep the Executive Council up to date.

The Committee would like to thank the Executive Director Comrade Valerie for applying for the grant. We appreciate all the help you have given us.

Poppy Fund Assessment 2020

Is any consideration being given to reducing the branch Poppy Fund assessment for this year?

Branches are concerned that fund raising during the 2020 Campaign will not be as successful as past years and that they will have difficulty meeting their obligations to veterans, dependents and the community in 2021. As such, some branches have been conservative in their disbursement of Poppy Funds while they wait to see what the Poppy campaign will look like under Covid-19 conditions.

Being conservative with disbursements means that there will likely be more funds remaining in branch Poppy Fund accounts on September 30th than in the past. Consequently, more assessment will be payable. A reduction **to 5%** of the Poppy Fund balance on September 30th, would show branches that there is concern for their ability to support veterans in their communities but not adversely affect the operation of the Command.

Based on the 2019 Command financial statement, a reduction of /to 5% would mean about \$33,500 less income. However, this loss should be offset by Fund surplus, which was \$29,000 in 2019, \$3,000 in Service Officer expenses for training which was not conducted this year and \$12,000 in bursaries which are no longer awarded (Council meeting Feb 22nd 2020).

The Poppy Fund Assessment is a NS-NU Bylaw. Nonetheless, experience has shown that it is possible to suspend or modify bylaws in unusual situations. This year's Poppy Campaign will be stressful and unusual thus warranting a change. Considering the matter now, would allow the Command Poppy Fund financials, for year to date, to be consulted and would permit any decision in favour of the proposal, to be announced with the directions given to branches regarding the submission of their Branch Poppy Fund Report for 2019-2020.

Executive Council Meeting

Nova Scotia / Nunavut Command Dartmouth, Nova-Scotia 19-Sep-2020

Greetings

Donations:

Due to the temporary closure of both Branch 168 & 169, there have been no requests for donations put forward to the branches. Branch 168 continues to support the Daycare, Cadet hall & elders hall. It has been incredible the number of national organizations who have been contacting Branch #168 for support.

Membership:

No new submissions during the closure. A major decline in the number of membership renewals due to the closure.

Cadets:

795 Air Cadet Squadron operations remain suspended but Branch #168, is maintaining the operation of the Cadet hall.

Branch Activities:

None.

Branch 168:

As ordered by the Nunavut Health Department the Branch closed on March 22nd. Some thirty two people were laid off the next day. By the 24th of March our kitchen take-out operation was up and running. The revenues brought in have gone a long way to assist in the payment of the monthly fixed costs. The bar reopened in accordance with Health Department orders on June 22nd. We are open from 12:00 till 14:00 each lunchtime and open from 17:00 to 21:00 on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays. Hours are being extended on Wednesday and Fridays depending on the crowd. As we can not have dancing on the main floor, we do not draw the mainstay younger crowd on Fridays and Saturdays. Our karaoke night is also not permitted under the regulations. While our wing night and steak nights are very popular, it is the food sales that our now our bread and butter versus beer and alcohol sales. The games room is unable to operate under the health restrictions imposed by the Government and the quiet lounge has also been closed. It is a balance between the cost of operating versus sales. So, we are just operating in the main lounge, at half capacity, but it reduces the wages component, for supervisors, cleaning expenses etc. All in all, a very challenging time financially and requires constant vigilance to ensure that we remain viable. With the high costs associated with life in the Arctic (on 2 staff apartment Buildings, daycare, Cadet hall & Branch) this has proven challenging.

Branch 169

Branch #169 just like all the other Branches across the country has been impacted by this pandemic. With Government of Nunavut restrictions in place in March, we closed our doors a week prior to the Government of Nunavut's enforcement on closing public establishments because our membership & executive were unsure of the unknowns of Covid-19 and we were receiving mixed feelings from our membership.

Branch #169 remained closed between March 13, 2020 to June 23, 2020, during the re-opening phase our capacity dropped by 50% with (40 people max including staff), our hours of operation were from Wednesday to Saturday from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm. This remained in effect until July 22, 2020.

Between July 22, 2020 to today our hours of operation are now back to normal Wednesday to Saturday from 7:30 pm to 12:30 am, the capacity remains at 50% with the Government of Nunavut regulations following covid-19 precautions. The last 5 months have impacted the Legion in Rankin Inlet, but we are working with what we can and continuing to move forward.

Our insurance renewal is another story, we are frustrated with our current insurer in that despite the restricted operating environment they have proven unwilling to adjust premiums to reflect our reduced seating capacity and the adverse impact that is having on branch revenues. In fact our insurer increased our annual premium this year despite the fact we were closed for nearly three months by a pandemic related Public Health Order and the possibility we could potentially be shut down again dependent on how things go in the fall. Branch 169 has never filed a claim against our insurance nor have we ever been sued. Upon our request NS/NU Command directed us to another potential insurance agency "Programmed Insurance Brokers" who provide coverage for a number of other Branch's across the country but despite providing them with the requested Branch 169 information we never heard back from them. Anyway, at this point we have decided to pay the \$10,000 premium to our exiting carrier HUB International this year.

We are holding our AGM in October, date to be set at our September monthly meeting. The positions of President and Treasurer are up for election this year. I have included Darrin Nichol, Treasurer in this email, Comrade Nichol has been a huge asset to Branch #169 since we re-opened in 2016, after being closed for two years he also served on the Executive when the branch 1st opened 27 years ago. I hope Comrade Nichol stays on with the Executive, his valuable historical information on Branch #169 and his expertise and knowledge on the finances and operations of Branch #169 cannot go unnoticed.

My term as President since 2016 has been the most rewarding experience, I have worked with many different executive members over the last four years but there are three main people who have stayed on (Comrades Nichol, Wyatt & Karlik) each year a new executive member brings new ideas and support to Branch #169. I am not sure if I will run again in the October elections, I am still undecided. I have sat on the Legion Executive in various positions since 2003, taking two years off in 2013-14 for maternity leave. It was between 2015-2016 when the Legion officially closed it doors due to an older unusable building, and I would like to mention President Karlik at the time tried so hard to keep the Legion open but it just couldn't happen.

My September District Report is short and sweet this time, with Covid-19 we have so many unknowns and it is hard to predict our future. We have been lucky in Nunavut so far, with no positive cases. I hope it

continues to stay that way.
