Veterans Long Term Care

NS/NU Command District E Commander Daryl Cook stated that the issue of Veterans long term care has been brewing for a long time and that the matter had come to a head within District E when NS/NU Command President McRury with ABMO 36, called upon Branches to contact their MLA's regarding the utilization of designated Veteran long term care beds for the general public. He stressed the importance of having long term care available to all Veterans regardless of service in designated Veterans Units. Comrade Cook informed the meeting that he has had many meetings among Veterans within District E. That group devised a position paper on the issue of long-term care which was circulated to Executive Council prior to this meeting and has approached MLA's and VAC on making changes to the eligibility criteria and having the Veterans units remain open. The group has also approached members of the NS Standing Committee on Veterans Affairs. He stated that after 7 concurred resolutions from National Conventions calling for change of eligibility, District E feels nothing has changed. He advised that the group within District E brought the issue directly to VAC and were referred to the government of NS which in turn referred the group to VAC.

That Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command through our President and Dominion Command Executive Council contact the government of Canada to change their criteria and keep Veterans Units and long-term care beds open into the future for post Korean Veterans with health conditions attributable to service.

NS/NU Command President Donna McRury thanked Comrade Cook for bringing the matter forward stating that the response from VAC to the latest resolutions pertaining

specifically to Veterans LTC and eligibility for such were included in the "green book" Report on Resolutions" circulated to all Branches in late June. The "green book" report clearly laid out the RCL position that the organization was pleased that provincial contracts in Veterans LTC were under negotiation and that VAC consultation with stakeholders on the issue would be forthcoming. She directed the Executive Director to raise the District E position paper with the VAC District Director of Veterans Services at the next scheduled meeting and report to Executive Council after which Executive Council will consider next steps. In answer to these comments Comrade Cook advised the President that the group was not giving up just because the matter had been brought to Executive Council. He stated that the group "had feelers out to the media", were preparing resolutions and plan to reach out directly to other RCL Commands and other Veteran organizations. President McRury reminded Comrade Cook of bylaws and jurisdictional parameters pertaining to those advancing issues as representatives of RCL and in dealing with the media and assured Comrade Cook that Executive Council will determine next steps following a report on information contained in the position paper as called for on this most serious matter. She restated NSNU Commands support for change to eligibility criteria to include all Veterans with health conditions related to service and to the preservation of Veteran designated LTC facilities. President McRury related that she did not recall matters as related by Comrade Cook at this meeting recorded in District E minutes as being presented and approved by the District membership. Comrade Cook advised that the issue as presented had not been brought before the membership of District E. President McRury restated her intention to bring the matter back to Executive Council to determine next steps when verification as requested of the E.D. has been received. Given that commitment Comrade Cook withdrew motion 32.

## Youth Leadership Training Camp

NS/NU Command Leadership and Development Committee Chairman Glen Leduc suggested to the meeting that NS/NU Command look into sponsoring youth to enroll in Christopher Leadership Courses. He provided information on the cost and format of the courses.

NS/NU Command Chairman Tom Young presented to the meeting his experience on being a Trainer and Lifetime Member of the Christopher courses of Canada.

Discussion ensued and it was ascertained that whilst Dominion Command is striving for standardization across the country, they do not have jurisdiction over the issuing of license plates in any Province. The meeting was reminded that the 3 years service criteria was the decision, with wide consultation, of Veterans in NS.

It was noted that The Royal Canadian Legion does have a nation wide relationship with PIB Insurance and they are well versed in the business of the Legion.

## Summer Student

NS/NU Command Leadership and Development Committee Chair Glen Leduc suggested that expertise is required to assist in video production of Leadership Development material. He informed the meeting that funding in the form of wage subsidy is available under the Canada Summer Job program for employers. He outlined that applications for this grant close in January with approval known by the end of each year.

Through discussion it was ascertained that Command does not have the provision to supervise a summer student nor the tools necessary for video production. NS/NU Command District A Commander Clarence Dawe suggested that an alternative idea would be to reach out to NSCC to see if they have a student that has these skills and would be able to do the work and gain a credit for their program.

#### NS/NU Command Executive Council Veterans Services Report

Our bureau is dealing with Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) disability applications, reviews/appeals and when requested assist with Benevolent fund applications.

Since 1 Jan and as of 31 August 2022:

- We are handling 261 open/active VAC files (note 1)
- We had 132 favorable VAC disability claim decisions so far this year and only 15 unfavorable.
- We have been responsible for \$ 10,485,762.18 dollars awarded. Which is the equivalent to financial lump sums for VAC disability claims. Clients have an option of taking a monthly pension for life or a lump sum payment. As important to these monetary pay outs are, no matter monthly payments or the lump sum, the medical benefits given to each veteran is for the rest of their life.
- Withdrawn claims 51(note 2)
- We are now interviewing clients in the office, standard COVID precautions are being taking.

Note 1 - This includes Disability claims (first applications and departmental reviews), but also such things as Veterans Independence Program applications, Caregiver Recognition Benefit applications, Survivor applications, etc. Note 2 - Claims are withdrawn for various reasons such as Veterans moving and not forwarding new contact information or Veterans not following through with their responsibilities in the process after an excess of a 5 months of assistance.

Since 1 Jan 2022, our Bureau Service Officers participated in Monthly National Service Officer teleconferences. We will be attending the Bi-Annual Service Officer Professional Development in Charlottetown PE from the 26<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> of September.

On behalf of the Command Service Bureau, thanks to all Branch Service Officers, Branch Executive and members for their dedication and determination. Also, to the Command Executive for their unwavering support. The work of the Service Bureau would not be accomplished without all your assistance.

#### Comrades,

I will be heading to Ottawa in November to attend council meetings. Updates from Dominion Command are as follows:

Membership:

- As of Aug 29- 227,498 members have been processed for 2022. This is approximately 13,800 more than the same time last year.
- 25,707 new members have joined, up 9,700 members from the same time last year or 60%......3% of all new members are currently on a 1-year free introductory offer

#### 2023 RENEWAL STICKERS

2023 stickers are now being delivered to all Branches for all members renewed for 2022 by the end of July 2022. If Branches have not received their stickers by September 6<sup>th,</sup> they can reach out to Member Services for follow up.

The Auto Renewal Billing process for the 2023 membership year will run in early November. As online membership processing continues to grow, we remind local Branch Membership Chairs and Executives of their obligations under <u>Privacy Law</u> regulations to ensure we are taking the necessary steps to protect our members private information. Branches are advised to update their Portal passwords when there has been change to the individuals who access secure Branch information.

It is important for Branches to ensure a secure login password to prevent unauthorized access to a Branch account

#### The New Biodegradable/Recyclable Poppy, Wreath and Cross

2022 marks the first year for biodegradable poppies and wreaths, available for purchase in our Wreath Catalogue. Biodegradable substances are those, which degrade or break down naturally. In other words, their decomposition happens with the help of natural agents like sunlight, microorganisms, and water. The following is a description of each component of each Item available in the Wreath catalogue. Please note that not all materials are biodegradable and may need to be removed and recycled as per individual waste management.

#### **OP Harmony**

The Legion has contracted Strategy Corp to undertake an organizational assessment on the state of Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion in the Legion. Our IPP Marion Fryday-Cook is on the Dominion Command Committee as well as the Chairman of NS/NU Command Committee. Comrade Marion will give updates at our Council meeting going forward with our committee.

#### Public Relations

Dominion President featured in key news reports: misconduct, wait times Two key reports were released in May, including the Arbour report on sexual misconduct in the Canadian Armed Forces, and the Auditor General of Canada's report on the wait times experienced by Veterans after submitting a disability benefit claim.

Juno Beach development – Committee members are familiar with the issue. The Legion is not in favour of development. While the Legion and VAC cannot dictate what France can do, both are advocating for an appropriate resolution.

*ii. Federal budget 2022 – The Legion released our reaction to the budget. While significant money went to defence, culture change, and homelessness, we still want to see movement on previous promises including the marriage over 60 clause.* 

Telemarketing campaign – A reminder that Legion Headquarters is conducting a telemarketing campaign to encourage lapsed members to renew. Committee members are encouraged to make their Branches aware of this, as some members may be concerned it is a fraudulent phone call.

The Legion Dispatch is shared monthly with valuable information to be shared. As well as was discussed that each Command share their news letter.

Via Rail Promo for Legion Members:

- 25% off on best available fares in Economy class valid in the VIA Rail network using promo code LEGION25. Exclusive to Legion members and up to 3 guests.
- Offer valid upon presentation of the Legion member card and photo ID.
- Booking must be done between September 1 to November 11 for any travel dates during the month of November.

The Legion Nationals Track and Field was held August 5-7 2022, in Sherbrook, QC. Information will be updated at our Executive Council

The Legion was asked for its views on this ongoing issue, and some of them are reflected in the following stories which were carried by many outlets. You will note comments by former Legion colleague Duane Daly in the first piece – which ultimately stemmed from a recent disrespectful action as described in the second piece.

#### APPLICATION AND APPROVAL PROCESS: SECTION 207

- Use the current Dominion Command application Form 800281
- The nomination **MUST** be approved at an Executive or General meeting of the Branch or Command, Section 207 b
- Minutes of the meeting where the award was approved must include the name of the person nominated and the names of the nominator and seconder, Section 207 b. In camera meetings are acceptable but must include the name of the person nominated and the names of the individuals attending the meeting (preferably minutes of the meeting)
- Honours and Awards Committee nominations, without proceeding to an Executive or General meeting for approval, WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED
- Include copies of applications and citations of prior awards, i.e. Life and/or MSM (MSA). This aids the Committee members in making proper decisions.

Leadership and Training Development Committee Report August 31<sup>st</sup> 2022

The Leadership and Training Development Committee consists or Comrade Conrad Gilbert, Comrade James Leadbeater and myself, Glen Leduc.

The Committee has not met since the Council Meeting in May. Committee members have been working in their respective appointments and Comrade Leadbeater has been offering guidance and assistance to branches in District A, in preparing their Bylaws.

The Command President presented me with several topics that she believes should be developed into presentations:

- 1. A presentation on using Zoom as a beginner video produced and made available online
- 2. A presentation on hosting Zoom meetings in hiatus as I do not have the technical knowledge to record portions of the presentation and I have not been able to find the expertise
- 3. Video presentation on effective meetings soon to be released based upon the presentation given at the Command Convention in October 2021
- 4. A presentation on motions and resolutions in the writing stage
- 5. A presentation on liquor licensing and branch responsibilities in the design stage
- 6. A presentation on writing grants script is written and I will be assisting the author on recording and editing the presentation.

Myself and Comrade John Quilty of Centennial Branch 160, are conducting presentations on developing a branch Poppy Campaign. Two sessions have been conducted to date with at least two more planned for September and October. The sessions are conducted by Zoom and recordings of the sessions have been placed online for branches and commanders in the Command to view.

There is little expertise available in producing video presentations and volunteer time to prepare, record and edit material is scarce. Everything that has been done to date is self-taught which equals less than professional results. We need the skills and expertise of someone who is trained in video production but it is a skill set of younger people.

Video production is being taught at NSCC and in journalism courses at universities. However, these are not the people one finds in the Legion.

Funding in the form of wage subsidy, is available under the Canada Summer Job program for employers who provide *quality summer work experiences for young people* 

Typically, applications for this grant close in January with approval known by the end of April of each year. Now is the time to begin preparing an application.

I move that the Command prepare a grant application under the Canada Summer Jobs program, to hire a student to produce video and written training material for the Command.

The year began with a protest in Ottawa, where the self/titled "Freedom Convoy" occupied several downtown blocks of our nation's capital. Defence minister Anita Anand stated, "The right to protest is something those honoured at the tomb sacrificed their lives for, however the desecration of this memorial is unacceptable and shameful."

Youri Cormier, executive director of the conference of defence associations institute explained. The Tomb of the unknown soldier is not a place for slogans and civil disobedience, it's a place of prayer, gratitude, and introspection.

Canada Community Revitalization Fund will help Fairview legion benefit from renovations to help bring veterans families and community members back to public spaces safely.

Amherst remembers D-Day and rededicated its refurbished cenotaph.

The RCL is helping mark National Indigenous History month by sharing how our Indigenous traditions percolate throughout the organization today.

Canadian War Museum project to preserve veteran stories. With 20,000 second world war veterans remaining, a project by Canadian War Museum seeks to preserve their stories. The legion is supporting this initiative.

Armed forces veterans are not immune to the housing crisis and homeless issue plaguing Nova Scotia.

In the last year and a half, NS/Nun command has advocated and represented 19 veterans who were shelter insecure.

The Veterans Outreach Programs of NS/NU Command are constantly evolving around our Veterans requirements in order to remain relevant. We must keep pace with the changes that are affecting the lives of our Veterans and their families.

#### Hero's Mending on the Fly

Hero's mending on the fly had a great year and were able to facilitate fly tying clinics from Jan - Apr with 8 participants in HRM and 8 in the Valley. This was followed by a combined casting clinic in May for all 16 participants held at Graves Island Provincial Park. They were once again very fortunate to have Casting instructors Lewis Hinks and Rene Aucoin donate their services to put this on for us. They finished up this years program with a 3 day fishing trip to the Margaree. They had 14 participants and 6 volunteers attend. All were Veterans or serving members. The program was overall a great success and a great benefit for all involved. They also supported the Rolling Barrage this year with HMOTF members teaming up with Windsor Legion to help with a BBQ lunch on 2 Aug. It is all about veterans helping veterans.

This year they will be conducting their annual volunteer trip Sept 26-28th at the Normaway Inn. The afternoon of the 27th is scheduled for AAR and planning of next year. This year they have been very pleased by donations this year with \$8200 from NS/Nunavit Dominion Command, RCL and a total of \$12500 from individual Legions. HMOTF could not do what they do without the RCL. This is where all of our funding has come from this year. They will be providing Command a year end financial report in the fall detailing all revenue and expenditures.

#### **The Farm Project**

#### **Camp Maple Leaf**

NSNU Command, through the Benevolent Fund, Veterans Outreach program, sponsored 4 children of Nova Scotia military Veterans in attending the Camp Maple Leaf Camp for Heroes in New Brunswick in August. This was the first time Camp Maple Leaf has operated outside of Ontario. Camp Maple Leaf is sanctioned by The Royal Canadian Legion. Camp Maple Leaf is operated by a registered charity and provides children of Canadian Military Families and children who share similar unique life challenges a camp to call their own. The use of poppy trust funds is permitted under Transition Programs for Veterans with advance approval by Command via special use application . The Camp Kids of Heroes is a special session for the children of our heroes whose parents are living with an operational stress injury, creating a supportive community with others who share their life experience. Camp Maple Leaf Camp for Heroes supports and celebrates them for who they are, and fosters friendships that follow them home. Working with the mental health professionals from various Military Family Resource Centres,

Camp Maple Leaf offers this one-week camp session dedicated to providing extra kid-friendly support. Camp for Heroes is a supportive social network that campers can lean on and relate to throughout the year. Offering the realization that they are not alone with the challenges they face, a normalization of their life situations, new coping skills the Camp creates increased resilience. Although only just returned at writing of this report, initial feedback gives every indication that NSNU Command Campers thoroughly enjoyed the experience. A full follow up will be reported to Veterans Outreach Committee when convenient for the families. Camp Maple Leaf offers other camps for children of those serving and no longer serving as well as leadership development opportunities that may be of interest to NSNU Command. ## VETERANS SERVICE RECOGNITION BOOK REPORT TO EXECUTIVE COUNCIL 17 SEPTEMBER 2022

Comrades, as I have no access to the Command's financial information, please refer to the general revenue statement, operating revenue - line 4525, which indicates the current revenue earned for the 2022 edition of the VSRB.

On 15 August, Command received a report from Fenety Marketing regarding our 2022 VSRB 18<sup>th</sup> edition and the financial forecast is not quite as promising as in previous years. The report states in part, *"In regards to our up-to-date results from your 2022 project, our gross sales are current at 88.78% of our final 2021 project results and we are expecting some additional business advertising sales to finish up over the next few weeks so we are projecting that our final gross sales to be in excess of 90% of our previous year's results."* 

"...your Command's net earnings, including our \$2,500 annual contract signing bonus, should be in the \$82,000 to \$84,000 net earnings range, more in line with our 2020 results (\$84734.36) instead of our 2021 (\$89981.84) end results.

The report offers several reasons for the lower revenue earnings, and states, "...however, this year is our most challenging in a while as we are facing challenges in recruiting new tele-fundraising reps and the high increase in the cost of living which have impacted many of the private citizens, we call for support each year." "We remain confident in our organization's ability to meet these challenges; however, we have reported up to 10% reductions in gross and net revenues for a good number of this year's projects to date."

Comrades, although the report is not as positive as hoped, we cannot expect every year to exceed the previous. Keep in mind that our Command, over the past 18 years, has realized a profit of **\$1,503,954.60**, with few to little expenses incurred over this time period.

The deadline for submissions for the upcoming edition, volume 18, was 31 August. I extend my thanks to our regular contributors, however, to date, submissions from branches and the public have been almost non-existent. If this trend continues, the future of this publication may be in jeopardy.

In closing, I will end this report as I always do, please inform your branches that submissions for these publications are vital to the continuation of this project and their assistance is of utmost importance. *Our Veterans deserve no less!*

## Seniors' Advisory Council of Nova Scotia

Re: Nova Scotia Power Rate Increases 2022-2024

Dear Mr. McGrath and Mr. Deveau:

On February 24, 2022, I wrote a letter to both of you voicing the profound concerns of the nine organizations in the Seniors Advisory Council of Nova Scotia to the Nova Scotia Power (NSP) request for a rate increase in 2022, 2023 and 2024. These proposed rate increases averaging 3.3% in each of the next three years will have a very detrimental effect on our over 120,000 members.

The Seniors Advisory Council is also deeply concerned about the following five issues that will have major financial implications for vulnerable low and middle fixed income seniors:

- 1. The creation of a Decarbonization Deferral Account which will place \$370 million in an account in preparation to offset the costs related to writing off or depreciating coal fired plants in 2030. It is anticipated that NSP will return to the UARB to recover the costs from rate payers in a separate application.
- 2. The creation of a Storm Recovery Rider which would apply when the cost of extreme weather exceeds what NSP has budgeted and placed in power rates. If approved by the UARB the company could charge rate payers an additional amount capped at 2%. It is worth mentioning that the UARB has twice fined NSP for failing to meet its performance standards when the company tried to place the blame on the weather.
- 3. That a separate line be added to the power bills to recover the costs if Efficiency One spends more money on energy conservation and efficiency programs over the next three years than what NSP had forecast.
- 4. Nova Scotia Power will be asking the UARB to have rate payers cover the \$52 million in excess fuel costs due to delays in accessing power from Muskrat Falls.
- 5. Nova Scotia Power is asking the UARB to maintain its average of 9% Return on Equity, but also wants to extend the range from 8.5% to 9.5% to potentially make a profit of MEMBER ORGANIZATIONS: CARP, COMMUNITY LINKS, NOVASCOTIA FEDERATION OF SENIORS, NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FEDERAL RETIREES, NOVA SCOTIA GOVERNMENT RETIRED EMPLOYEES ASSOC., NOVA SCOTIA RETIRED TEACHERS' ORGANIZATION, REGROUPEMENT DES AINES DE LA NOUVELLE-ECOSSE, ROYAL CANADIAN LEGION, NS / NUNAVUT COMMAND, RETIRED DOCTORS NS

9.5%. To put this into perspective, NSP expects to earn \$153 million in 2022, \$192 million in 2023 and \$213 million in 2024.

As a regulated monopoly delivering an essential service, NSP is not a financially risk investment. The SAC questions if the 9% return on equity reflects the actual cost of capital in today's market. If NSP shareholders continue to be guaranteed a return on capital so much greater than the cost of capital, would that not be a subsidy paid by ratepayers?

The SAC is profoundly disappointed in NSP's unreasonable request for a three-year residential rate increase of 10% and with other five concerns we have raised in our correspondence to you.

Lower and middle, often fixed, income seniors are struggling! They now must contend with mounting inflation and significant increases for food, pharmaceuticals, transportation, utilities, municipal taxes and rent or property maintenance.

The Seniors' Advisory Council of Nova Scotia respectfully requests that the UARB not grant the requests from NSP for a power rate increase over the next three years and, in addition, decrease the return on equity to the actual cost of capital in today's markets.

## LONG TERM CARE (LTC) FOR POST-KOREA VETERANS

1. Current VAC legislation (policies and procedures) funds long term care for veterans of WW II and the Korean War. Those veterans are referred to, by VAC, as 'war service veterans.' It appears that the Government of Canada (GoC) intends to eliminate funding for all VAC LTC **contract beds** once the last veteran of the Korean War dies. Under that plan all post-Korean War veterans (service commencing on or after 28 July 1953) will not have access to federally funded LTC contract beds.

Admittedly there are other benefits available to the post-Korea veterans, but the sense of a **"veteran community"** will be lost with the loss of the LTC contract beds located in various Veteran Units/Wings found in provincially owned hospitals.

2. According to Reference A, on 31 March 2021 there were 592,300 post-Korean War Canadian Armed Forces veterans. Undoubtably a number of those veterans would have experienced war, and war like, conditions in various hostile settings since 28 July 1953 (peacekeeping, peace enforcement, peace making, war fighting).

3. Reference B notes that war service veterans seeking long term care may receive a community bed (available to any provincial resident) or contract bed which is fully funded by VAC.

4. Using Nova Scotia as an example for LTC facilities within a provincial health system:

a. Reference C hi-lighted that:

I. there are 1,936 people on the long-term care waitlist with 333 waiting in hospital;

about 7,500 Nova Scotians live in a long-term care facility;
 and

iii. more than 21 per cent of Nova Scotia's population is over 65 years old, the third-highest percentage in the country.

b. Reference D notes "The latest data shows that Nova Scotia has a record 4,278 people on wait-lists for placements in long-term care (LTC) facilities" with Michele Lowe, then the executive director of the Nursing Homes of Nova Scotia Association, as saying, "This list could potentially double within the next five years."

5. Regardless of the precise wait-list numbers in Nova Scotia, and with similar situations in other jurisdictions across Canada, it is important that our veterans have timely access to LTC beds, and not find themselves waiting for weeks, months and perhaps longer for the health care support they have more than earned. Hence our concern about the importance of VAC's funding LTC beds for post-Korean veterans with physical incapacities resulting from an injury that occurred in the line of duty.

6. It is not reasonable to believe that the Royal Canadian Legion can change any current demographic trends in any province; however, it can advocate for long term care funding for post-Korean War veterans.

7. It is the position of District E that the NS/NU Command take action to encourage the Dominion Executive Council (DEC) to approach the GoC, via VAC, and demand they change their policy on LTC beds to include all Canadian post-Korean War veterans that require long term care based upon deteriorating health condition(s) attributable to their military service.
